#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

As I sit down to write this message, we are getting ready to celebrate the July 4th holiday when we would normally congregate with friends and family. However, despite the reopening of many businesses and venues in the Tri-State area, we are now hearing of increases in coronavirus cases in many parts of the country and the need to continue to wear masks and social distance ourselves. The health and well-being of all TLS members and students remains a top priority as we consider when and how to safely reopen activities at TLS.

Anticipating that the need for social distancing will continue for some time, the TLS Board has made the difficult decision to cancel Gemarama 2020 at The Greater Philadelphia EXPO Center in Oaks, PA. Instead, we are hoping to offer a "Virtual Gemarama" this fall which will allow members and visitors to experience what TLS and Gemarama are about. Any TLS member who wishes to help with this endeavor should contact me or Linda Lakitsky. We especially need the help of computer and Internet savvy individuals. Please stay tuned, watch your email, and follow us on Social Media for more details.

The TLS Board has also taken the following steps:

- •No classes or workshops will be offered this summer.
- •This summer we will work to establish the necessary safety protocols, procedures, and equipment to safely reopen the Education Center this fall.
- •Plans for the fall term will be announced in early August. We expect that the fall term will be somewhat limited with fewer classes and smaller class size. We hope to offer 1 or 2 day workshops.
- •We have extended the deadline for members to submit nominations for the Coren and Colio awards to July 31, 2020. Nominations should be sent to Stacey Segal. We will plan a suitable award ceremony for a later date.
- •The Board and Gemarama Committee will be meeting over the summer via Zoom to make the necessary decisions as we approach the fall.
- •We plan to resume the General Meetings virtually this fall using Zoom. Stacey Segal will be giving a presentation about her trip to the Middle East at the September meeting. Watch for emails and articles in the Bulletin about using Zoom. We plan to offer several Zoom test sessions for TLS members this summer. Again stay tuned.

The TLS Education Center will remain closed for the summer. John Chickadel and others will continue to make periodic visits to check on the building. Periodically, some work will take place at the Education Center such as equipment cleaning and repairs, class preparation, and work on the jewelry room electrical supply, etc. Education Center Director John Chickadel will authorize and oversee the schedule of any activities at the Education Center over the summer so he will know who is going to be there and ensure that we maintain social distancing and other safety measures.

Sales on eBay will continue as Stacey has items to sell. She recently sold a Faceting machine and accessories donated by TLS member Drew Schmith on eBay for more than \$1400. Thank you Drew and Stacey! This is an important source of income for TLS at a time when we cannot hold classes. I encourage members to consider donating items for sale on eBay. If you have items you wish to donate to TLS, please contact Stacey. Arrangements for drop off of items at TLS can be made with either Stacey or John Chickadel.

Over the summer we plan to keep everyone up to date through emails, the TLS website, Facebook, and Instagram. We would love to see what you are working on and what your home studios look like. So please feel free to send me photos. As mentioned in the last Bulletin we are looking to install video equipment as a teaching aid in the Education Center. If anyone has expertise in this area, your help would be appreciated.

#### JUNE BOARD MEETING MINUTES/HIGHLIGHTS

There was no General Meeting in June.

The TLS Board met in a ZOOM meeting at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 3. The minutes of the May Board Meeting were approved as distributed as was the Treasurer's report. Announcement: Bead Fest Philadelphia 2020 is canceled.

#### **Committee Reports:**

Membership: There were no new members this month.

Programs: Kathy Hobson said that she has canceled the June Awards Dinner. After a suggestion that we may consider holding an event later in the year, Kathy said she would make a reservation for the evening of the December General Meeting, which could be canceled if necessary.

Education/Classes/Registrar: Kathy Hobson said that she would get started on the fall session a little earlier than usual to accommodate changes we may need to make to accommodate COVID-19 requirements.

Education Center/Facilities & Equipment: John Chickadel said that the air conditioner was inspected and cleaned, and filters replaced. He also said that he has been visiting the Ed Center about once each week while it has been closed. A few people have visited to prepare for the fall session, including holding an inventory of the jewelry studio and cleaning of the 14" slab saw. Linda Green asked that members go by the Ed Center periodically to deter potential vandals during the shutdown. Don Schwarzkopf said that he would work on the electrical system in the next few weeks.

Acquisitions: Drew Schmith has donated a Graves faceting machine, which he will deliver to the Ed Center this week. It will be put up for auction on eBay.

Gemarama: Linda Lakitsky said that Rick Hellman will contact the security firm to start the process of getting a contract for the show. She also said that she will contact Gary Cummings about reserving the truck. Linda Green said that a couple of vendors have dropped out and that there are two new vendors; a few vendors have not yet committed and there are still a couple of empty slots. The next Gemarama meeting will be held on Wednesday, June 17, at 7:30 PM via Zoom.

Old Business: Lisa Laffend reported that she attended a DCAC meeting and all organizations are adjusting their programs/events due to COVID-19. Delco Arts Week is still on the schedule for October 3-10 and will include in person events where possible as well as online events. It is rebranded as "Delco Arts Week @ Home". Online events may include live chats or performances, open houses and tours, demonstrations and discussions, and other ideas to engage viewers.

Linda Green said that Delaware County will move to the "yellow" phase of reopening this week, and possibly to "green" at the end of June. She said that she and John Chickadel are working on safety protocols for the Ed Center, particularly for the fall session. Linda also said that some other teaching facilities, for example William Holland School of Lapidary Arts and Peters Valley School of Craft have canceled all 2020 program-

ming.

There was a detailed discussion about implementation of a video system to provide online content and also to display during classes to prevent the need for students to gather closely around instructors. Linda will convene a group of volunteers to figure out what's needed, including cameras, camera mounts, video displays, and computers.

Board meetings will continue through the summer this year. The next Board meeting will be held on July 1 via Zoom.

New Business: Frank Warner carried out an analysis of the financial impact should it be necessary to cancel classes for the remainder of 2020 and to cancel Gemarama; a spreadsheet summarizing his results was sent to members of the Board. He said that, barring any new major expenses, TLS would still be in a very good financial position at the end of the year, even if all activities are canceled.

Linda Green said that we may consider some small open sessions later in the summer, primarily to test the protocols that may be implemented for the fall session, including small group sizes and disinfection procedures. She also will develop a plan about starting up the Long-Range Planning Committee.

Jody Shaw said that she would like to include a "member spotlight" for the Bulletin, which would include a few sentences about the member with a few photos, to help get to know everyone a little bit better. She has a short list to start and will soon be looking for volunteers.

#### JULY BOARD MEETING MINUTES/HIGHLIGHTS

There was no General Meeting in July.

The TLS Board met in a ZOOM meeting at 7:30 p.m. on Wednesday, July 1. The minutes of the June Board Meeting were approved as distributed as was the Treasurer's report.

Announcement: Linda Green announced that the Gem Miner's Jubilee Show in Lebanon, PA is canceled until August 2021. Their November 2020 show is still scheduled. Quench Jewelry Arts in Minneapolis is closing for good. Kieu Pham Gray (The Urban Beader) is offering a variety of classes under the title "Virtually Evercrafting" August 13 – 16, 2020.

#### **Committee Reports:**

Membership: There were no new membership applications this month.

<u>Community Programs:</u> Linda Green reported that she attended a Zoom meeting with the South Jersey Bead Society and talked about TLS. Other organizations with similar interests may be contacted in the future.

<u>Programs:</u> Stacey Segal will do a September Zoom presentation on her trip.

Education/Classes/Registrar: Kathy Hobson will begin to plan a reduced fall class schedule. Only one class of 4 – 6 people will be allowed in the building at a time. See "Old Business" below for more information.

Education Center/Facilities & Equipment: John Chickadel has visited the Ed Center each week. Everything is in order. Frank Warner has asked the cleaning lady to decrease her visits from once a month to once every two months.

Equipment & Facilities: Don Schwarzkopf plans to visit the Ed Center after July 4 to check everything and finish the electrical work

Gemarama: Linda Lakitsky reported that she met with her committee and due to the COVID-19 pandemic, they recommend that the normal Gemarama be canceled and a virtual event planning begin. Discussion ensued concerning the financial ramifications and possible exhibits/events which can be offered virtually. It was moved that the normal Gemarama 2020 at the Greater Philadelphia EXPO Center be canceled due to concerns for the health and safety of members, dealers, and the general public during the coronavirus pandemic. The motion passed unanimously.

Old Business: Lisa Laffend is open to suggestions for TLS participation in DCAC's "Delco Arts Week @ Home." Lisa also reported that the Delaware County Foundation is accepting grant applications, based on need, for the dispersal of federal monies to arts organizations.

Linda Green and John Chickadel will meet on July 3rd to review the county and state regulations and determine what the Education Center needs in terms of cleaning, signage, etc. in order to reopen during this phase of the pandemic. Discussion ensued regarding video equipment, instruction content and other details necessary for TLS to transition to videography/virtual classes. Linda Green and John Chickadel propose trial open ses-

sions in cabbing and torch with 4 or 5 people in August. Steve Hansen has been contacted by Mainline School Night regarding a class offering in October and possibly a second date. Cheryl Kaspers from Atlanta is still willing to teach a workshop on opal carving. Both fall classes are approved, with safety protocols in place. Linda Green will begin putting together a Long-Range Planning Committee.

New Business: Frank Warner made a motion that the Board seek membership approval for waiving the presidential term limit in the TLS Bylaws for the election of Officers for 2021. The motion passed unanimously. This will require a two-thirds vote by the membership and voting can be accomplished through a polling feature on Zoom at the September General Meeting done on the Zoom platform. Ken Dahl will take over as Treasurer and there will be an open Director position.

Linda Green made a motion that all current memberships be carried forward through 2021, and that payment of dues for continuing members in 2021 be entirely voluntary. The motion passed unanimously.

Frank Warner updated the Board on the news that the TLS 2020 scholarship recipient, Sydney Coleman, from Sun Valley High School wishes to postpone her studies at Rosemont College until the 2021 fall term. Frank responded to Sydney that she could tell Rosemont College that it was fine with TLS for the college to hold her tuition scholarship for the 2021-2022 academic year, and that he could follow up with the school, if necessary.

Though it is expected that General Meetings will be through Zoom for the fall months, Frank has reserved the Springfield Township Building meeting room space for the next nine months so they are available, if needed. The reservation may be canceled, as necessary.

Linda Green made a plea for social media content from members.

Jody Shaw talked about new TLS Bulletin features, including a monthly member spotlight and a history of TLS.

#### A NEW HISTORY SERIES

With this issue of the *TLS Bulletin*, we are beginning a series of articles on TLS history. Much of the series will be drawn from 34 *Bulletin* articles from 2003 - 2006 that were incorporated into the history booklet produced in 2007 for our 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

#### TLS HISTORY SERIES #1

Last fall we celebrated our 50<sup>th</sup> Gemarama that began with shows in 1968 and 1970, and then ran every year from 1972 through 2019. Given our break from our show this year due to the coronavirus pandemic, it seemed a good time to revisit some of the show history. Why do we put on the show? Where has it been located? What features have been added or have disappeared; and what features have survived all of these years?

I have attended Gemarama every year since 1972. From what I can remember, and from the information that is available in TLS Bulletins and in the 2007 50<sup>th</sup>-year history project, I will try to pull together some of the highlights for you. The answer to my first question is easy. We put on the show because we love sharing with the public our love of lapidary, jewelry making, and glass arts. It is fun showing others, from kids to adults, what we do and getting them interested.

#### GEMARAMA – PART 1: HOW IT ALL BEGAN

From the earliest days of the Tuscarora Lapidary Society, members were eager to display their creations and tools to the public. At the September 1957 meeting, just six months after the Society's formation, a discussion was held on the possibility of preparing a jewelry display for exhibit in a local store. The resulting first Tuscarora display was held at the Manoa Paint & Hardware Store in the Manoa (part of Havertown) Shopping Center, November 15-17, 1957.

A second display, consisting of a grinding wheel and a sanding and polishing machine, was held at Murphy's Variety Store in the Manoa Shopping Center on May 22-24, 1958. Subsequent displays were held at the American Legion Post in Lawrence Park in June of 1959, in Murphy's store in June 1960, and at the Russell School Hobby Show in October 1961. For 10 days beginning March 6, 1962, the Society had a display at the Western Savings Bank at 69th Street.

An exhibit of members' work was on display at the Marple Township Public Library for the month of November 1964. Library staff members reported that the display was favorably received by the public. The display received front page notice in the November 12 issue of the *RECORD*, the newspaper of Marple & Newtown Townships. It is interesting to note that TLS returned to the Marple Library for month-long displays in advance of Gemarama beginning in 2003, a practice that continues today.

The last record that I have been able to find of a window display during the Society's early years was for the Springfield Township Library for the month of November 1965. That display window was 16 feet long, 8 feet high, with room for 6 shelves according to an article in the *Bulletin*, October 1965.

Discussions regarding a possible show that would include gem, mineral, and lapidary dealers began as early as 1962 when Bob Gilman of Lost River Caverns in Hellertown approached the Society with the idea of holding a show in Allentown. But with just a little over 30 members at that time, the Society thought it would be best to concentrate first on increasing membership. By the beginning of 1966, membership was up to about 80 and it was decided it was time to plan a show for 1968. A show committee was established (*Bulletin* January 1967) and preparations began in earnest.

The Springfield Township Municipal Building, where we currently hold our General Meetings, was secured (at no cost!) for the Society's first show to be held April 27-28, 1968. Initial projections were for an attendance of 1000 with an admission donation of \$.50 each.

There were eleven dealers for the Society's first show including Robert Gilman and T.B. Hagstoz & Son, names current members will recognize. Cabochon cutting and gem faceting demonstrations were given continuously both days. There were eleven competitive exhibits of minerals, jewelry, cabochons and faceted stones, all judged according to the Uniform Rules of the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, and an additional nine non-competitive exhibits. There were lectures on *Western Minerals*, *Cornog Minerals*, *Crystallography*, *Rock Hunting in Maine*, *Semi-precious Stones*, and a *Rock Hunting Safari*, as well as a movie, *Pursuing the Lapidary Hobby*, produced as a TLS club project.

The May 1968 *Bulletin* reported, "Our first 'baby' turned out to be a healthy, normal child, much to the pleasure and relief of its 'parents' and friends." Attendance was over 1500. Kenneth Wattman, in his president's message of June 1968, reported that the show cleared over \$300, money that was earmarked for the next show.

Planning for this initial gem and mineral show led to the realization that the Society should incorporate in order to protect members from individual financial and personal liability related to the show. The effort to incorporate was led by Robert P. Barnett, Esq., who joined TLS with Ken Wattman in February 1966. Incorporation papers were signed by Bob Barnett and Ken Wattman on April 10, 1967, in the state of Delaware. Federal 501(C)(3) status was obtained on October 25, 1968.

Notes: Kenneth Wattman remained a member of TLS until his death in 2014. Robert Barnett's status was changed to Honorary Member in 1979. He died in 2012. We are indebted to both Ken and Bob who, along with Presidents James Johnson (1966), and Donald Naples (1967) established TLS on a firm legal footing as a non-profit corporation.

In the past, her quilts have been accepted into juried national and international quilt shows. This one is her latest project called Grandmother's Flower Garden. It is a hand piecing project that also helped keep her sane during the last three months with the quarantine. In addition, she has been staying busy these past months making over a hundred masks for frontline workers.
