The November 2 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:31 p.m. by President Stacey Segal. The minutes of the October Board and General Meetings were approved as distributed.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Ken Dahl reported cash inflow and outflow for the month of October showed a negative total due to the remaining balance on the contract at the Expo Center and the recent purchase of Genie wheels. The mineral show sale netted \$679 and the silent auction at the October TLS Meeting netted \$1676.

Committee Reports:

<u>Membership</u>: Gary Cummings reported that Eric Thompson has met the requirements for membership and his membership was approved.

<u>Community Programs</u>: Linda Green reported on the Open House at the TLS Ed Center on October 7th. Even though there were only a few visitors, they were very interested in what we had to offer. Linda shared that she and Vincent DiAngelus recently discussed working on having Scout programs after Gemarama and the holidays. During the DCAC meeting, all the member organizations discussed their activities offered during Delco Arts Week.

<u>Programs</u>: Stacey Segal announced that the November meeting will include a presentation by Helen Serras-Herman, presenting on carved gems, and the December meeting will include the Holiday Party and elections. Programs for next year are in the works.

<u>Ed Center Director</u>: Vincent DiAngelus reported that he will investigate the report on a missing digital scale that was in the closet in the electrical room. In the meantime, Dennis Coren offered to bring his own scale for classes. Vince also

<u>Class Manager</u>: Steve Hansen reported that earlier this month, classes were held in conjunction with Virtually Evercrafting where students were at the Ed Center and instructors taught virtually. Everything went really well. Steve stated that this is a good way to bring in known instructors for classes. The weekend cabbing workshop held in October marked 10 years of offering this workshop through Main Line School Night. Dates are set for next year. Registration for winter classes should begin around the 21st of November.

<u>Registrar</u>: Stacey Segal thanked Frank Warner for checking the requests and updating the roster while Bill Frampton is away. Frank Warner reported that there are a couple of small problems that occur with the registration system and made a motion to hire Hoff Communications to make revisions to the registration software to resolve the issues. This was approved. <u>Equipment and Facilities</u>: Don Schwarzkopf reported that he and Anthony Lombardo updated all the roller carts for Gemarama.

<u>Library and eBay</u>: At the request of Sheryl Dahl, Stacey Segal reported that she will purchase a book called "Classical Loopin-Loop Chains" by Jean Stark, as it will be an invaluable resource for teaching this type of chain making.

<u>Gemarama</u>: Mimi Favre reported that one of the vendors, Unconventional Lapidarist, called to say they both have the flu and cannot make Gemarama. Due the unfortunate nature of the cancellation, a motion was made to approve a full refund to the vendor, which was seconded and approved. Mimi announced that everything else for Gemarama is ready to go. Barry Messino also agreed that all is ready to go. All volunteer shifts are covered with those who signed up and with the offers from those who will be floating. Anthony announced that the awards are ready, and Linda Green noted that the kid's certificates are also ready. Ken Dahl stated that he will bring the money needed for cash/change. It was decided that the grab bags will be sold for \$2.00 each.

Old Business

Stacey Segal announced that Paul Stieff has volunteered to cover the Assistant Print Communication Chair position. We are also still in need of a Programs Chair.

New Business

COVID - 19 UPDATE, WINTER 2023

The health and well-being of all members and students of the TLS community continue to be our top priority. WINTER CLASSES BEGIN JANUARY 5, 2023

TLS offers classes to adults interested in pursuing lapidary and jewelry arts. No previous experience is needed unless a prerequisite is noted. In some courses and workshops there is an additional charge for supplies and equipment. Pricing for classes is listed for members (M) and non-members (NM). Membership requires completion of Beginning Cabochon or Faceting class, participation in two TLS monthly meetings, and willingness to participate as a volunteer in TLS activities. Course details, including the required supply and tool lists for many classes, and our online registration system, may be found at <u>https://www.lapidary.org/classes-winter-2023</u>. Fees for supplies are payable to the instructors and may depend on the choice of materials.

REFUND POLICY: If you wish to withdraw from a class, workshop, or open shop session, you must notify the Registrar by phone or email. Payment will be refunded 100% if you withdraw before the course, workshop, or open shop session begins. For multiday courses (not workshops or open shop sessions), payment will be refunded 80% if you withdraw before the second class. No refunds are given after the second meeting of a multiday course. No refunds are given after the first day of a multiday workshop. No refunds are given for missed open shop sessions (Exception: Members may receive a 50% refund, if requested, after missing an open slab-saw session).

Students are enrolled in the order that online payments or checks and registration forms are received. Please note: Checks for full tuition must accompany the registration form in order to reserve a spot in the class. Learn how to improve your jewelry photography and editing skills. (W23GF2-11) **Beyond Beginner Glass Fusing – Three Techniques**: (Two-day workshop, Saturday & Sunday, February 11&12) 10AM-4PM. Limit 6. Take your fusing skills to the next level! Learn the ins and outs of the Freeze and Fuse process to make objects for use in your fused projects. Learn to use stencils with powders and learn to use a glue pad with stamps to add to your fused glass designs. Instructor: Lynn Bibolet and Jody Shaw. Tuition: NM\$150/M\$90.

(W23MC2-25) Vulcanizing Rubber Molds and Injection

Wax: (Two-day workshop, February 25 & 26) 9AM-4PM. Limit 8. Beginner/Intermediate level. If you want to preserve a special piece of jewelry, you can easily make a duplicate. Creating a rubber mold is a great way to make multiple copies. Using simple supplies and following basic instructions, you can be a rubber mold-making expert in no time. Then you can inject hot wax into a mold and remove a perfect wax replica, ready to cast into metal. This class will focus on vulcanizing rubber molds and injecting wax under pressure in the molds to create a disposable wax model for casting. Instructors: Dennis Coren, Don Schwarzkopf, and John Chickadel. Tuition: NM\$120/M\$60. Materials fee (payable to instructor) approximately \$70 (includes rubber, wax, and supplies).

(W23MC3-11) **Jewelry Investment and Casting**: (Two-day workshop, March 11 & 12) 9AM-4PM. Limit 8. Beginner/Intermediate level. This class will focus on vacuum investment and vacuum casting using the "Lost Wax" technique. Instructors: Dennis Coren and John Chickadel. Tuition: NM\$120/M\$60. If setting square stones is a challenge, this workshop is for you. Create something truly different from the standard round or oval settings. You will learn a new process for making square, tube-set bezels. These settings are designed to hold your stones without having to pierce the corners of the metal. We will also set a stone on top to add color. Guest Instructor: Kieu Pham Gray. Tuition: NM\$149/M\$129. Note: Tuition includes materials kit fee of \$37. **Remote**: (W23KG1-8R) Tuition: NM\$154/M\$134.

(W23KH1-8) **Connections**: (3 hr workshop, Sunday, January 8) 2PM-5PM. Limit 10. Skill level: Beginner. Using sterling

silver strip, we will connect all of the pieces together to create

a bracelet. Then we will take our time with some finishing work. Guest Instructor: Kieu Pham Gray. Tuition: NM\$106/M\$86. Note: Tuition includes materials kit fee of \$12. **Remote**: (W23KH1-8R) Tuition: NM\$111/M\$91.

OPEN SHOP SESSIONS

Instructors who wish to take advantage of this policy must advise the Registrar of the specific course or workshop for which they would like to use the benefit.

A TLS member who supervises an Open Shop session, other than Open Slab Saw, may, at no cost, be a participant in that Open session. Supervisors of Open Torch sessions contribute \$10 per day towards the cost of oxygen and gas. A TLS member who supervises five hours of Open Slab Saw may use the slab saws for one hour free as long as at least one other TLS member certified in slab saw use is present, as required by the TLS Safety Rules.



Member Spotlight

In 1971, I took a Main Line School Night course on making cabochons. The teacher was Walter Lawn of the Tuscarora Lapidary Society. In the class, we worked on Sears Craftsman lapidary equipment with a single horizontal silicon carbide wheel that had to be changed for each different grit. The class was fascinating.



My family spent the summer of 1972 in Rio de Janeiro where I was the guest of a Brazilian mathematics institute. Having graduated from Penn State in 1959 with a degree in




Engineering Science, and from MIT in 1963 with a Ph.D. in mathematics, I taught at MIT 1963-64, at Berkeley 1964-68, and had joined the faculty at Penn in 1968. There were amazing gem shops to visit in Rio and in Belo Horizonte. I brought home a wonderful collection of rough including amethyst, citrine, topaz, several varieties of tourmaline, morganite, and a half pound of the finest rose quartz I have ever seen. I

was hooked on lapidary and decided to join TLS in December of 1972.

Both members and the Society were very active in competitive exhibiting at the time. For the general lapidary category of competition under the Uniform Rules of the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies, ten points could be won by including in the exhibit ten different types of work. To be able to receive all ten of those points, I had to learn about more than just making cabs.

One day in 1973, TLS member Joseph Schweiger

invited me to his home to learn how to make spheres 'by hand'. Then in early 1974, I purchased a Facetron faceting machine and a



faceting book by Glenn and Martha Vargas and taught myself to facet. In summer of 1974, on the way home from a mathematics conference in Germany I arranged a stop in Idar-Oberstein where Gerhard Becker gave me pieces of rough sodalite, rhodonite and a beautiful banded calcite out of which



to make bowls. I had met Becker at the first International Gem and Mineral show in Washington DC earlier that year where his bowl cutters carved gorgeous bowls. When I got home (with a very heavy suitcase), I worked on cre-

ating my own equipment to carve bowls freeform by hand, modeled on the equipment Becker's cutters used at the Washington show.

In 1976, I entered a general lapidary case in competition in the Eastern Federation show at Topsfield, MA, and received the trophy for general lapidary with a score over 90, having received all 10 possible points for variety of work (cab, composite, faceted stone, doublet, triplet, slab, sphere, carving (bowl), transparency (iris agate), contour polished specimen).

My activities at Penn kept me from being very active



with TLS for much of my career. In addition to research and teaching, I held various administrative posts at Penn. I did manage my schedule to be able to help at Gemarama most years. I took Roger Binns' silversmithing course several times to learn how to create jewelry pieces that my wife Ada had designed for some of my cabs. I learned to make intarsia and chan-

nel jewelry. And in the 1980s, I took the courses necessary to become a GIA Graduate Gemologist. I retired from Penn in 2000.

I had worked with many TLS members, especially Roger Binns, on TLS Long Range Planning for many years. In 2010, when TLS finally was able to purchase its own building, I helped




coordinate the renovation project, and wrote the project history.



After retirement, my attention turned toward working with glass. I had taken a TLS course in the 1990s from member Ruth Newlin on making glass beads with copper cores at a torch. In 2001, I took a glass beadmaking course at the Community Art Center in Wallingford. Over the next 10 years I was fortunate to be able to study with several of the country's top glass artists

in making glass beads, marbles, flowers, casting, fusing, and

glass blowing at the torch. Most glass workshops have a "cold working" (lapidary) studio. When TLS was finally able to purchase its own building in 2010, I developed the TLS Glass Program to complement our offerings in lapidary and metals. In addition to teaching classes in the glass program
