BOARD AND GENERAL MEETING MINUTES/HIGHLIGHTS

The Board Meeting was called to order on December 1, 2021 at 7:36 p.m. by Linda Green through ZOOM. The minutes of the November Board and General Meetings were approved as distributed.

Announcements: Linda Green reported that former member Betty Smith passed away. She was 94. Betty joined TLS in 1982. Her many accomplishments included master level SKIP awards and the Colio Award in 1998.

Treasurer's Report: Ken Dahl reported cash inflow and outflow for the month showed a net positive total. There were numerous transactions for the month including partial Gemarama profits of more than \$10,000. Membership dues for 2022 have been paid by more than 60% of members. A pre-

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liminary budget will be prepared and issued via email to TLS Board members next week.

Committee Reports:

Membership: Stacey Segal presented seven new membership applications: Mollie Rossi and Matthew Kehler (spouses); Zasha Morales-Jose; Mason Kester; Tina Brunner; Kay Greer and Karen Audi. All applications were approved by the Board. Programs: Linda Green reported that Kathy Lopez has booked the following programs: January's ZOOM meeting will feature a video called "Illuminations: Nature as Art" by Paula Crevoshay; Phil Stokes, Director of Penn Dixie Fossil Park and Nature Reserve will make a ZOOM presentation in February; a Silent Auction (in person) will be held in March; April is to be decided; May will feature an instructional program about creating an exhibit case; and June will feature the Awards Ceremony and dinner.

<u>Education Center</u>: John Chickadel stated that he scheduled an equipment/facility prep session on December 29. When the annual Brookhaven recycling letter arrives, he will fill it out and return it.

<u>Class Manager</u>: Steve Hansen stated that registrations for Winter Term are underway.

<u>Acquisitions</u>: Frank Warner stated that he and Doug McNicol accepted a large donation, including a faceting machine, from Ed Brightbill.

<u>Equipment & Facilities</u>: Don Schwarzkopf stated that he and Steve Hansen will assess and repair the TLS faceting machine that had problems at Gemarama.

<u>Library and eBay</u>: Stacey Segal stated that she will put some of the books donated by Ed Brightbill in the library. The remainder will be listed on eBay.

Gemarama: Barry Messino stated that the event was successful. Frank Warner stated that attendance was over 1600, the best in many years. Preliminary accounting reveals a net profit of about \$10.000.

Old Business: Lisa Laffend attended the DCAC meeting. She reported that all the organizations are trying to move forward as the pandemic continues. Frank Warner reported that Lynn Bibolet will chair the print communications job. Mary Batter will assist her. Linda Green stated that volunteers for Education Center Director and SKIP Chair are still needed. Linda will work on community programs and attend the DCAC meetings. Paul Stieff has volunteered to keep the Education Center stocked with beverages, snacks, and paper products.

The December 8 General Meeting will feature awards, election of officers/directors, and the TLS Holiday Party. The approved slate of officers and directors was announced. (See next column.) A reminder email will be sent to members and guests.

Linda Green updated the Board on the COVID-19 status. Little information is known about the new Omicron variant. Through the winter, TLS will continue with precautions currently being observed.

New Business: Frank Warner noted that updates to the Operations Manual will be presented to the TLS Board in January. The Board and attendees thanked Linda Green for her three (3) years of service as TLS President.

The General Meeting of December 8, 2021 was called to order at 7:34 p.m. by President Linda Green. In attendance were 26 members and 1 guest. Committee and other items discussed at the Board Meeting were briefly presented.

Frank Warner stated the collection of class tuitions and a large Gemarama attendance at the Expo Center contributed to a good financial condition for TLS.

John Chickadel invited members to attend the equipment/facility prep session on December 29 from 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon.

Steve Hansen stated that registrations for Winter Term are underway. He asked members to consider signing up for the open slots in metalsmithing classes.

Frank Warner stated that Barry Messino (Chair) and Anthony Lombardo (Co-chair) will be working soon on the initial phase of work for Gemarama 2022. The attendance this year was over 1600, the best in many years. TLS netted about \$10,000 profit.

A vote was held and the slate of officers and directors for 2022 were approved. They are listed below. In addition, plaque awards were given to outgoing officers and committee chairs. A list of names and awards appears on page 3.

Following the business meeting, the Holiday Party commenced. Members enjoyed beverages, "potluck treats" and the company of each other.

JANUARY PROGRAM

The program will be a video by Zoom, of a talk given by Paula Crevoshay at the 2019 Dallas Mineral Collecting Symposium, titled Illuminations: Nature as Art. GEMARAMA EXHIBITS 2021

Even though exhibits were down 33%, enthusiasm for the theme from show attendees and exhibitors was UP! Of the 16 competitive exhibits, 11 followed the 2021 Gemarama Show Theme, PICTURES IN STONE.

Polina Fenik of Drexel Hill captured Best in Show, displaying her artistry by matching her photographs to picture jaspers and other picture stones. The biggest struggle for the viewer was to select only one favorite.



Stacey Segal demonstrated her stylish mastery of metalsmithing and won the Best Theme Display with a creative arrangement of picture stones in categories of flowers, prehistoric creatures, seascapes, landscapes,



stormy skies, flames, abstract art and celestial bodies, a wonderful picture stone gallery.

An amazing organization of spheres from A to Z presented by Pam Pollister and Vince Albicelli of Phila. Mineral Society taught us how a mineral got its name. It was an elaborate exhibit that won the Most Educational Award.



Lisa Laffend's Small Case Award gave us a delightful array of glass making techniques, showing birds in vases, paperweights and other objects of art, including one hollow hanging



piece that seemed to express, "when pigs fly."

Karenne Snow of the Phila. Mineral Society knows how to "Picture This," showing how nature forms rock pictures as a natural process, and was the Best Non-Member Display.



We don't often think of Chinese snuff bottles as examples

of pictures in stone, but John O'Hara of West Chester surprised us with several theme related agate bottles in an attractive presentation, and earned the Director's Award. Can you imagine editing a picture from inside a snuff bottle?



DMS member Hans van Binsbergen brought us a top quality bright green grouping of iron and aluminum silicate specimens from Mali and Malawi, Africa. Ellen Schwarzkopf presented fascinating polished picture slabs and wire wrapped picture pendants. Kathy Statton's lifelike bird intarsias, a copy of a wintery greeting card in picture stone pieces, and picture jewelry were just a few of the attractions. A stunning polished agate chunk in the shape of Africa was memorable.

Linda Green's presentation of Dendritic Pictures in Stone was spectacular. The arrangement of necklace props, and stands of several sizes for the polished slabs was particularly pleasing, giving the splendid stones the best offering to us. Maxine Burkholder's magnificent pendant jewelry demonstrated her creativity, along with exquisite pictures just waiting to be set. Thanks to John Chickadel, we were treated to the many pastel pictures in stone representing the scenic landscape of Dening, New Mexico.

Members of the Granite Farms Estates Lapidary Club must have had fun collecting pictures in stone from talented residents, including TLS members Kathy Statton and Betty Smith, whose intarsia camper was remarkable. The combination of pierced coins and backing of lapidary materials by Chuck Buski provided us with awesome and unique works of art for our enjoyment. First time exhibitor Logan Antonowski of Souderton, PA, brought an extensive collection, both family and personal, of minerals and arrowheads. We hope to see more from this young man in the future. Not an opal case for Bill Mattis this year, but the "Enchanted Forest" was a boulder opal chunk. Favorites from attendees were Picasso stone, "Into the Woods" and dendritic agate "Snowy Meadow." The Betty Smith Christmas diorama received many praises from attendees, including dealers and exhibitors, but especially the children

INSTRUCTOR BENEFIT

It is TLS policy that TLS members who teach a regular course (fall, winter, spring, or summer) or a substantial workshop may, within the following twelve months, take a regular class or workshop without paying the normal member tuition. Any special course fees or materials fees in excess of tuition must be paid by the member making use of this benefit.

Instructors who wish to take advantage of this policy must advise the Registrar of the specific course or workshop for which they would like to use the benefit.

A TLS member who supervises an Open Shop session, other than Open Slab Saw, may, at no cost, be a participant in that Open session. Supervisors of Open Torch sessions contribute \$10 per day towards the cost of oxygen and gas. A TLS member who supervises five hours of Open Slab Saw may use the slab saws for one hour free as long as at least one other TLS member certified in slab saw use is present, as required by the TLS Safety Rules.

TLS History Series #15 Highlights, Part 3: 1973 - 1977

1973

A bylaw change in 1972 increased dues to \$10, the first increase since the Society was formed. Retired members could still pay dues of \$6 per year if they wished. The registration fee for new members was now \$5.

The issue of workshops and classes for members vs. private instruction was discussed. In the early years of the Society, if a member wished to learn a new skill, they would ask a member expert for instruction and would be invited to that member's home for private lessons. However, there were also thoughts that TLS might eventually have a workshop of its own.

1974

In his president's message in the April 1974 *Bulletin*, Eldridge Mount said that while TLS was not able to support a building of its own at that moment, "let's all be on the lookout for a suitable site." Architect member Norman Mansell prepared an initial plan for a TLS facility, reproduced on page 7 of that *Bulletin*. The TLS Building Fund was begun. The Society was not in a position to support a workshop at that time because Gemarama, which was to become the Society's main income producer for many years, was in its early years and its existence was not guaranteed from year to year. Gemarama 1974 was only the 5th show. At that time, each subsequent show required a positive vote of the membership (as well as a willing Show Chair!).

Al Weber suggested an exhibit for the blind be constructed. The Blind Association made the signs in Braille on aluminum sheets for use with the exhibit. Sphere, carving and intarsia divisions were to be added to SKIP.

1975

The Indian intarsia was finished for the show. A half-hour Gemarama '75 program was aired on Channel 12 in August as part of the "Take 12" series. Gemarama attendance exceeded 4000.

1976

The TLS exhibit for the blind was displayed at the New York Gem and Mineral Show.

In his initial Bulletin message in January, President Philip Delano said, "We now have all the tools, except possibly one, to help anyone who wants to improve a lapidary skill. The thing that is missing is a place to go and work on a lapidary project without a feeling of intrusion into someone's home. We need a TLS lapidary workshop. Therefore I propose the primary project for this year to be the setting up of such a workshop in a place where it would be accessible to all TLS

members." President Delano's proposal was controversial. Many members in favor of a workshop had long felt that it was an imposition to invite oneself into another member's home for instruction, and also desired a place with lapidary equipment, such as a large saw or vibra-lap, that would not normally be found in a home lapidary workshop. Others were very concerned that a workshop would place a serious financial burden on the Society, that it would require that Gemarama be given every year, and that it would spell the end of the close family spirit they felt was engendered by having members teach each other individually. The pro and con positions were strongly held.

In his March 1976 message, President Delano announced that an experimental workshop had been rented on Smedley Lane in Newtown Square to see if members liked it, open 9 a.m.-10 p.m. with classes on lapidary and jewelry making and for members to work on a pet project or get advice. Members were asked to donate, loan or sell equipment for the workshop.

After a successful two-month test run, the Board decided the workshop should not be continued at the expense of a maturing building fund or by making it mandatory to hold Gemarama just to support the workshop. However workshop proponents proposed a plan for the workshop to be continued and run by a standing workshop committee with the workshop supported exclusively from income from services provided. The Board approved. By fall classes for members were offered in cabbing, carving, channel jewelry, and faceting, and a display was prepared for Gemarama.

TLS had a balance of \$3076.54 on December 1, 1976.

1977

The tentative TLS budget for 1977, independent of the separately managed Workshop, was \$1,400. Equipment and supplies were donated or loaned to the Workshop and pledges of support were enough to cover its \$1,250 budget for the year. Classes were offered in carving, channel jewelry, cabbing, faceting, jewelry, photography of gems and minerals, finishing rough castings, gem identification, and sphere making. The Workshop Committee assumed responsibility of running a food concession at Gemarama, thereby providing a major future source of income dedicated to the Workshop. The Workshop was made available for Gemarama Committee meetings. The controversy over the Workshop continued within the Society with financial worries playing a substantial role.

An article by Paul Longnecker on "The Tuscarora Intarsia" was featured in the February issue of *Lapidary Journal*. The Coren's home was extensively damaged by fire. Club members donated funds to help Ben and Chesna recover.

Dues remained at \$10 per year, but the registration fee for new members was increased to \$15. The registration fee would stay at that level until 2014.

The Tuscarora Lapidary Society (TLS) is a 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation and a Pennsylvania Purely Public Charity organized to encourage and teach the science and art of lapidary (the cutting and polishing of stones) as well as the arts and sciences associated with lapidary interests. This mission is accomplished through general meetings, an annual show, educational courses and workshops, and free displays and presentations; all open to members of the general public. TLS meets the second Wednesday of each month, except July and August, at 7:30 p.m. in the Springfield Township Municipal Building, 50 Powell Road, Springfield, PA 19064; the June meeting is a dinner held at a local restaurant. Visitors are always welcome; anyone interested in joining the society may talk to any officer about the dues and membership requirements.
