BOARD AND GENERAL MEETING MINUTES/HIGHLIGHTS

The May 4 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:34 p.m. by President Stacey Segal. The minutes of the April Board and General Meetings were approved as distributed.

Announcements: Stacey Segal shared that Eileen Magee and her husband Terry are both ill, but on the mend. A get well card will be sent. Joanne Morris is doing better and will be at the June dinner. Stacey's husband will be having surgery on May 20th.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Ken Dahl reported cash inflow and outflow for the month of April showed a positive total. Sales at the April silent auction were upwards of \$3100. A \$1000 check has been sent to Sun Valley High School for the scholarship TLS sponsors for a student.

Committee Reports:

<u>Membership:</u> Gary Cummings presented two new full membership applications for Jessica and David Trapanese. These memberships were unanimously approved.

Community Programs: Linda Green attended the DCAC meeting. October 1-9 is Delco Arts Week. They would like our events by mid-June so promotions can be started. The Board agreed that an Open House can be scheduled for October 7th at the Ed Center. An outreach will be made to ask people to demonstrate the different things we teach. Linda also mentioned that Jim Johnston brought a set of minerals

and specimens for use in community programs for Scouts and other groups.

<u>Programs</u>: Kathy Lopez announced that WiFi technology at the Springfield Township building was successfully tested. A test run by Zoom will occur during the General Meeting next week. TLS is pleased to present an abbreviated class/workshop schedule for Summer 2022. Our glass program is always active during the summer months and this year in no exception, with Pâte de Verre and Lampwork Bead workshops, as well as several Open Torch sessions. Summer might be a good opportunity to learn more about the TLS glass program. We also offer a highly informative lecture course on Opals, and some specialty workshops in Opal Cutting, Gem Faceting, and alternative silver casting techniques.

We encourage you to use the summer session to learn a new skill or to refine your existing skill set working through our SKIP program.

EDUCATION CENTER THERMOSTATS

There are two thermostats in the Education Center, one labeled HERE, and the other labeled AWAY. They work automatically, and under normal conditions should not be touched. The system that Don Schwarzkopf designed switches automatically from the HERE thermostat to the AWAY thermostat when no-one is in the building, and switches back to HERE when people are in the building.

The heat (winter) and cool (summer) settings are set as noted on the upper right of the classroom white board, and should not be changed (HERE: heat 70°, cool 72°) (AWAY: heat 67°, cool 76°). The only times when we need to make changes are when the seasons are changing in the spring and fall, when we switch back and forth between heat and cool as needed. At the moment, both thermostats are set on cool for the summer.

JUNE SINGLE STONE EXHIBITION

Our June awards program will be held by Zoom on Wednesday, June 8. Stones submitted for the exhibition will be shown in a Powerpoint or video presentation during the meeting. If you have not yet submitted your cabochon or faceted gem for the Single Stone Exhibition, get your stone turned in and receive a written review on your skill and the quality of your work. The deadline for submission is Thursday, May 26.

As mentioned in the previous bulletin, to submit your cab, put it in a baggie, labeled with your name and the name of the stone (picture jasper, red agate). Faceted gems should be placed in an appropriate container before being placed in a baggie; be sure to label it clearly and include the diagram used to cut the gem. The collection point is a plastic container in the lower right-hand drawer of the desk in the library at the Ed Center. Numbers will be assigned before the judges see them so they do not know who they are evaluating.

SUMMER CLASSES BEGIN JULY 7, 2022 TLS Education Center, 24 Upland Road, Brookhaven, PA 19015

TLS offers classes to adults interested in pursuing lapidary and jewelry arts. No previous experience is needed unless a prerequisite is noted. In some courses and workshops there is an additional charge for supplies and equipment. Pricing for classes is listed for members (M) and non-members (NM). Membership requires completion of Beginning Cabochon or Faceting class, participation in two TLS monthly meetings and willingness to participate as a volunteer in TLS activities. Course details, including the required supply and tool lists for many classes, and our online registration system, may be found at https://www.lapidary.org/classes-summer-2022. Fees for supplies are payable to the instructors and may depend on the choice of materials.

REFUND POLICY: If you wish to withdraw from a class, workshop, or open shop session, you must notify the Registrar by phone or email. Payment will be refunded 100% if you withdraw before the course, workshop, or open shop session begins. For multiday courses (not workshops or open shop sessions), payment will be refunded 80% if you withdraw before the second class. No refunds are given after the second meeting of a multi-day course. No refunds are given after the first day of a multi-day workshop. No refunds are given for missed open shop sessions (Exception: Members may receive a 50% refund, if requested, after missing an open slab-saw session).

Students are enrolled in the order that online payments or checks and registration forms are received. Please note: Checks for full tuition must accompany the registration form in order to reserve a spot in the class. MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

I grew up in the Philadelphia suburbs in Collegeville. I graduated from Temple University with a Bachelor's degree in English. After I graduated, I wanted to find a job where I created a physical product rather than managing information. That's when I started my bread baking career.



Bread is very temporary in terms of creative expression. You can make the per-

fect bread, but part of its perfection is its consumption. So I wanted to pursue a creative process that would outlast myself, something in opposition to the fleeting production of foodstuffs. I took an interest in sculpting and started taking classes in clay and eventually casting/jewelry.

Two years ago I found jewelry studios and paid for benchtime, my preferred method of learning. I started with cutting designs in sheet metal and texturing them with a flexshaft burr, and I moved on to setting some stones in those designs. Next, I began fabricating mixed metals, then progressed into three-dimensional objects. For the sake of authenticity and learning, I use only cold connections. And at this point I don't make utilitarian pieces (e.g. wearable jewelry).

When I was hunting for rock sculpting classes, the closest thing I could find by word of mouth, through the jewelry community in Philadelphia, was cabbing at TLS. But I fell for stone cutting and filled the rest of my free time with open cabbing days at the center. With most metal work, I have almost complete control over the outcome of the piece after a lot of design sketching. Lapidary stands sort of opposite; the material makes a lot of the design decisions for me. I have a continued interest in sourcing local gemmy material from Pennsylvania. Now that I am a bit more in touch with this market, I look forward to getting out to more mineral/gem shows.

GROUND RULES FOR EXHIBITORS & AWARD SELECTION

JUDGING: Judging will take place prior to the opening of the show on Saturday; identifying labels will be added to the cases when judging is complete.

AWARD SELECTION: A committee of judges will evaluate all cases and select winners of the four category awards:

Most Educational (All educational exhibits are eligible.)

Best Theme Display – "A RAINBOW OF POSSIBILITIES" (All exhibits of theme material are eligible.)

Best Non-Member Display (Cases by non-members only are eligible.)

Best Small Case – 18" x 12" (Cases by TLS members only are eligible.).

Judging committee will select cases for Best in Show and Director's Award.

ELIGIBILITY FOR AWARDS: An exhibitor may win only one of the four category awards; all cases, including winners of category awards, are eligible for Best in Show or Director's Award. An exhibitor cannot receive an identical award two years in a row. For example, the winner in 2021 of the Educational Award is not eligible for the Educational Award in 2022. Certain TLS exhibits are not eligible for awards (Single Stone exhibition, Education Center display, Memorial cases, Intarsias, etc.).
