The October 5 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by President Stacey Segal. The minutes of the September Board and General Meetings were approved as distributed.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Ken Dahl reported cash inflow and outflow for the month of September showed a positive total.

Committee Reports:

<u>Membership</u>: Gary Cummings reported there are seven potential members who still need to meet the requirements for membership.

<u>Community Programs</u>: Linda Green reported there was no DCAC meeting today due to Yom Kippur. We are in the midst of Delco Arts Week which concludes this weekend. Our Open House at the TLS Education Center will be Friday, October 7th, 5-8pm. Linda has her crew to man this event and with the publicity provided, is hoping people will come to see what TLS has to offer. We have a table at the Philadelphia Mineralogical Society's Fall Outdoor Mineral Treasures show on Saturday, October 8. Linda also shared that the South Jersey Gem Show is this weekend.

<u>Programs</u>: Stacey Segal announced on behalf of Kathy Lopez that we do have programs lined up for the rest of the year. The October meeting will include the Silent Auction, the November meeting will include a presentation by Helen

Ed Center Director: Stacey Segal thanked Vince for having the light in the back of the Ed Center installed.

<u>Class Manager</u>: Steve Hansen reported that Main Line School Night will begin in 10 days. It is a full class with a waiting list of about 2. The deadline for registration for the Virtually Evercrafting Workshops is October 6, to make sure the kit is delivered on time. The winter term schedule will be listed in time for Gemarama. Steve needs to confirm a few more instructors.

<u>Registrar</u>: Bill announced that he will be away during a busy registration time, so Frank Warner will cover while he is away. <u>Acquisitions</u>:Doug McNicol reported there are no new acquisitions this month and that previous acquisitions, the cabbing machine and the trim saw, both sold for \$200 each.

Equipment and Facilities: Don Schwarzkopf reported on a few ongoing projects.

Library and eBay: Stacey Segal reported that she filed away all the books that she entered into the Library data base. To save on shelf space, Stacey is looking at purging any duplicate books and bringing them for the Silent Auction. One such book is a donated jewelry book. Linda Green offered to help Stacey price accordingly as this book is a coveted useful guide for metalsmithing. Stacey also reported that 22 of the 25 used Genie and Titan wheels from the TLS cleanup day were sold on eBay for a total of \$703.90. The last 3 wheels do have active bids. Bill Frampton reported that the new replacement wheels are in and restocked.

Gemarama: Mimi Favre reported that the vendors are booked and we are waiting for one balance check. Frank Warner shared that the dealer list is on the website. Ellen Schwarzkopf stated that she and Maxine will sort through the Silent Aucton items and that more items, such as slabs and specimens, are needed. Barry thanked Doug Klieger for the geodes to be used at the TLS Table and the Kids Table. Barry reviewed the Friday meal plans. Anthony Lombardo announced the next Gemarama meeting is on the 19th and encouraged cooperative efforts to advertise via the banners, posters, and flyers. Anthony thanked Lisa Laffend for heading the sign-ups for volunteering at Gemarama. Mimi Favre stated she will order the bookmarks. Linda Green let Anthony know she has the earrings and bracelets for the treasure wheel. Stacey Segal added that Jay Rosa sent an email to all the cab and faceting instructors to encourage their students to submit items for Single Stone.

<u>S.K.I.P.</u>- Stacey Segal announced, on behalf of Dennis Coren, that there will be a SKIP award to issue. Stacey will present this award at the next General Meeting.

New Business

- •Stacey Segal announced that we will need a candidate for a Board Director as Mimi Favre's two year term ends in December.
- •Stacey Segal reported that Mary Batter is stepping down as Print Committee Assistant.
- •Kathy Lopez will also likely step down as Programs Chair. Stacey stated that the Programs Chair position is a high prior-

ity item and is looking for suggestions for someone who would be a good fit for this role.

The October 12 General Meeting was called to order at 7:33 p.m. at the Springfield Township Building by President Stacey Segal. In attendance were 36 members and 4 guests. Stacey Segal welcomed all guests in attendance.

Committee and other items discussed at the Board Meeting were briefly presented. In addition:

- •Gary Cummings announced that he had the membership packets for the three new TLS memberships: Michele Cole, Gerald Fanning, and Adam Wechsler. Gerard Fanning was in attendance.
- •Linda Green announced the fall community programs that took place these past two months. Those who came to the TLS Open House this past Friday enjoyed it. Other programs where TLS participated included the Brookhaven Borough's Family Day, as well as at the Philadelphia Mineralogical Society's Fall Outdoor Mineral Treasures show.
- •Doug McNicol reported item sales at the Philadelphia Mineralogical Society's Fall Outdoor Mineral Treasures totaling \$702.00. Doug thanked Lisa Laffend, Ken Dahl and Janet Young for their help in supporting the TLS booth that day.
- •Stacey Segal reported \$800.00 in eBay sales for 24 of the 25 used Genie and Titan wheels that were listed.
- •Barry Messino announced that October 19th is the last meeting to prepare for Gemarama and that discount tickets, complementary tickets, and flyers are all available to take at the meeting tonight. Barry also asked if anyone has any donations for the Gemarama Silent Auction. Lisa Laffend thanked all those who signed up to volunteer at Gemarama and that the sign up sheet is available at the meeting for those who would also like to volunteer.
- •Jay Rosa announced that he is still collecting submissions for Single Stone and encouraged participation with submissions of a single cab or faceted stone that will be judged and placed in an exhibit at Gemarama.
- •Stacey Segal, on behalf of Dennis Coren, presented Vincent DiAngelus with a SKIP apprentice level in cabochons award for his two gorgeous stone submissions.
- •Stacey Segal announced that a volunteer for Print Committee Assistant Chair is needed as well as a volunteer for the Programs Chair.

Following the meeting, prior to the Silent Auction, Stacey Segal reviewed the process for the auction and shared that TLS vests, pins, and patches are on sale.



HELEN SERRAS-HERMAN, "CARVED GEMS -INSPIRATION AND EXPERTISE"

We are looking forward to having Helen Serras-Herman join us remotely for this November meeting at the Springfield Township Building. Helen will share, in a very unique presentation, her journey from sculpture to gem sculpture, and her influences and sources for inspiration. While showing examples of her 39-years of creating artwork, she will share how her sculptural art and artistic jewelry have been influenced by her world travels to mines and archaeological sites, and how her southwest environment and the ancient Greek mythology have inspired much of her artwork. Her jewelry collections and individual gem artwork always "tells a story", often reflected in the choice of rare and unusual gemstones. Helen will discuss how labor intensive the art of carving gems is and why, the gem materials utilized, and will show step-by-step of the necessary tools for gem carving, in the hopes of inspiring a new generation of gem carvers.

In her new book Carved Gems-Inspiration & Expertise, reflected in this lecture presentation, Helen shares her passion for carved gems, the interconnection between fine art and the spell-bounding natural mineral world, and her personal journey, along with



the challenges and joys of a gem artist's life. She reflects on her sources of inspiration and influences from historical places, mines, gem materials, landscapes, flora, and ancient Greek mythological figures, sources that collectors may find expressive and fellow artists stimulating.

TLS has an online system that members can use to submit updates to their membership information and to pay dues. 

Member Spotlight

This month I was happy to interview Barry Lynn Messino, who calls herself a "Jewelry Mechanic". When asked what that means, she



describes a mechanic as someone who repairs and designs jewelry. She does that and more.

Barry lived in Trenton, NJ until her family moved to Pennington, NJ, where she went to Pennington High School. She spent a short time studying business after high school and working at Shoprite, but ended up leaving home and moving to Philadelphia, much to the dismay of her family.

Gellar.


