BOARD AND GENERAL MEETING MINUTES/HIGHLIGHTS

The January 4 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by President Stacey Segal. The minutes of the December Board and General Meetings were approved as distributed.

<u>Announcements</u>: Stacey announced that Eileen Magee's husband Terry is being admitted to the hospital. We will keep Terry in our thoughts.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Ken Dahl reported cash inflow and outflow for the month of December showed a positive total. The 2023 TLS budget was discussed and approved as read.

#### Committee Reports:

<u>Membership</u>: Gary Cummings reported that new member applicant, John Frymyer, has met the requirements for membership. His application was approved.

<u>Community Programs/DCAC</u>: Linda Green reported that today was the first DCAC meeting of 2023. Delco Arts Week this year will be 9/30-10/8/23. Linda proposed we plan another Open House. She also shared that there is a Pennsylvania Arts and Culture Recovery Program to recover from the effects of the pandemic. This is state funding that non-profits in arts and culture can apply for. Since Gemarama expenses have steadily increased, Linda stated that we should look to see if we qualify for the grant. She also reported that the Delaware Mineralogical Society's show is coming up the first week in March and that we usually have members performing demos.

Kathy then shared the programs lineup for this year. In January, the program will be a presentation by Kristina Logan, a glass bead artist. In April, the program will be guest speaker Shelly Sergent, the Collections Manager of the University of Arizona Gem and Mineral Museum, either live or by Zoom. Kathy shared that Tina also provided a speaker suggestion so we may have four live speakers in place for 2023 in addition to videos that could be shared. Stacey Segal then initiated group discussion regarding next week's General Meeting. It was decided to have it via ZOOM only.

Ed Center Director: Vincent DiAngelus thanked those who participated in the Ed Center clean-up that took place before the holidays. Frank Warner reported that an estimate was obtained for Jim Bailey to do the repair work needed for the recaulking and sealing of the glass block windows. This was approved by the board.

<u>Class Manager</u>: Steve Hansen reported that winter registration has gone well. The added Saturday open cab sessions are sold out. There are still some open spots in Kieu Pham Gray's class in January and Martha Roberts/Shea's class in March. Steve will begin working on the spring session and encouraged those who would like to hold classes or workshops to reach out to him.

<u>Registrar</u>: Bill Frampton announced that he may need to step down from his position after the spring session.

<u>Gemarama</u>: After a brief discussion, Stacey Segal made a motion to approve to keep the dealer fees and the admission fees the same as last year. It was seconded and approved.

Following up on the discussion last month regarding needles being found on the premises of the Ed Center, Stacey Segal announced that a sharps container and thick gloves have been purchased and will be available on the shelf in the small bathroom at the Ed Center.

# MEMBER SPOTLIGHT

Our Member Spotlight this month is on our newest TLS Board Member, Tina Brunner. Tina's father, who recently passed, was her biggest influence in terms of arts and crafts. He was a model maker by trade, who worked for Grumman Aerospace where he worked on the space shuttles. In his spare time, he built scale models of trains and ships, made guitars by hand (luthiery), and built custom furniture. Tina's mother passed on her love of needlework. She taught her how to embroider when she was just five years old, and her dolls had the best wardrobes on the block because her mom sewed them all by hand. From both of them, she learned the value of making things.

Since Tina started crafting so early, she has mastered many crafts, including embroidery, sewing, knitting, crochet, needle tatting, rug hooking, cross stitch, crewel, needlepoint, polymer clay, paper crafts (including scrapbooking, scherenschnitte, quilling, rubber stamping), wire wrapping, and beads beads, BEADS. She can do anything with beads!

Tina found TLS by doing a web search for "learn how to cut stones". She was ecstatic to learn there was a place NOT in New York or California, where she could learn lapidary arts. Learning how to silversmith was a nice bonus.

Tina first got into beads when planning her wedding (which was 25 years ago). Instead of getting the typical bridesmaid gifts, she bought each bridesmaid a purse covered in silk flowers to carry instead of bouquets, and filled each with essentials for the big day. plus a set of jewelry she made herself to match their gowns. It was her first foray into making jewelry of any kind, and that set her off on a journey of discovery that will continue until she can no longer draw breath. Beginning with the simple stringing of beads, she taught herself how to string multiple strands, how to knot pearls, how to use findings, how to wire wrap, etc., and eventually moved on to setting stones, both cabochons and faceted stones. From there, it was a natural next step to learn how to cut the stones herself, and to learn how to make her own settings, which is where TLS came in.

Tina loves to visit gem shows and bead shows. Her favorite has always been the Gem Miner's Jubilee at the Lebanon Expo Center, but she thinks that got displaced last November when she visited Gemarama for the first time!

The most prized specimen Tina has in her collection was acquired just last year at TLS's Gemarama. She has long wanted a real alexandrite for her collection, and she found it at Gemarama...it not only has the standard alexandrite color shift, but it also has a cat's eye!

When asked if she has taught her skills, Tina answered that she has only taught her daughter to work with beads. She seems willing to teach but notes that others are already teaching some of her skilled areas. But, she says perhaps she could teach beadweaving or pearl knotting if there is interest.

Tina really doesn't use websites to learn...she uses classes and books for that. She is inspired by the works of famous jewelers, such as Faberge, Winston, etc. She also likes to create jewelry to match nature, and for that, her inspiration is the photographs she takes.

#### TLS History Series #21 TLS Name & Logos

The Tuscarora tribe were transient residents in the Locust Valley of Pennsylvania in the early 1700s during their 90 year migration from the Carolinas to New York State. There are a variety of sites in Pennsylvania named after the tribe including Tuscarora State Park in Schuylkill County.

When TLS was founded, the Charter members chose Tuscarora for the organizations's name in recognition of the local tribe, and in recognition of the lapidary skill of Indians in creating beautiful articles of adornment, especially their work with stone such as turquoise.

In May 1986, Ted Silver Hand, a direct descendant of the Tuscarora Tribe, gave a General Meeting talk "Tuscarora Nations History and Folklore." From the minutes of that meeting, "He talked about the customs of the tribe and the Six Nations of Indians, Tuscarora being the sixth. He made interesting comments relating to our Tuscarora Indian Intarsia." TLS was given a photo of a Tuscarora Chieftain and a beaded pipe by Ted Silver Hand at that talk. The photo and pipe are stored in Archive box #15 in the TLS Education Center.

In March 1993, Vice Chief Hawk Brown and his wife Chief Buffy Red Feather of the Southern Cherokee Confederacy of Pennsylvania gave a General Meeting talk on *Bone Jewelry and Artifacts*. Hamilton Hawk Brown had become a member of TLS in September 1992. He served TLS in several roles. He was a Director on the TLS Board in 1995. He was in charge of program equipment and locking up after General Meetings that year and assisted with exhibits at Gemarama. He also arranged for a half-page Gemarama ad to appear in the Southern Cherokee Confederacy Program in May of that year, a show attended by thousands of people. He passed away June, 2005. Chief Buffy Red Feather, of East Mount Airy PA, passed away at age 93 on October 23, 2021.

#### Intarsia, Medallion, Logo, Symbol, Pins, Patches

**The TLS Indian intarsia:** Although started in 1962, most of the work on the intarsia was done in 1975. The following photo of the Indian intarsia has been used in several places (website, You-Tube Channel, Facebook, Instagram) as a TLS logo.



An article by Paul Longnecker appeared in the Lapidary Journal, February, 1977. That article can be viewed in this <u>link</u>.

A die was created for producing the **TLS Medallion**, probably shortly after TLS was incorporated in Delaware in 1967. This medallion is attached to our award plaques. The medallions are made from our die by Larry Paul Casting Company on Sansom Street. The figure of the Indian in the medallion was used in the TLS logo that one sees on TLS letterhead.





Sue Garrett's photo of bolder opal with a wire-wrapped opal together with the motto "We teach the journey from rock to gem to jewelry" has been used as a symbol for TLS in several applications including our 3-fold color brochure and on our Philly Fun Guide Page.



A variety of TLS pins have been created over the years. Here are some examples. The pin on the left is an old one - date unknown. The pin on the right, created in 2022, contains just the date TLS was established and no current date.



Various patches have also been created over the years, often to be sewn on vests or embroidered onto polo shirts and worn at Gemarama or other public TLS events. On the left is a polo shirt embroidery patch from 2012. Linda Green created new designs in 2022, the one in the middle below for a patch, and the one on the right for embroidery onto maroon or burgundy colored polo shirts.

# – From Frank Warner, Historian TLS DIGITAL RECORDS

In preparation for the 50th anniversary celebration of TLS in 2007, a lot of work was done by many members to help gather sets of various TLS records. We were able to acquire at least one paper copy of every TLS Bulletin, and copies of all Gemarama Programs. Many thanks were given to those early members who "never threw out anything." Unfortunately, 25 original membership applications were never found although we had records of those applications in the Minutes and Bulletin.

I recently completed scanning all of the membership applications for which we have copies. The scans are stored in a folder in our TLS ARCHIVE Dropbox. The applications are organized by member number and year. This is not a searchable archive since the hand written information on applications does not lend itself well to optical character recognition.

In 2012, Lola Fields scanned one of our complete sets of TLS Bulletins – a huge task! Then Joe Rokosky used Adobe Acrobat Pro to convert that set of scans into a searchable database. Every year after that, until he passed away in 2017, Joe would add the most recent year of Bulletins to the searchable set. Since 2017, I have taken over that task and just recently added the 2022 Bulletins to the searchable database. This digital database is stored in the TLS ARCHIVE folder in Dropbox.

Gemarama programs have also been scanned and are in a searchable database in the TLS ARCHIVE Dropbox.

Any member who needs access to this information can get a link from Lisa Laffend, who is the owner of our TLS Dropboxes. Lisa can also provide information on how to use the searchable databases.



Should this scenario occur, all affected students will be called by the respective instructor and, if possible, a message will be placed on the Center's voicemail system.

If a General Meeting is canceled or an emergency or other circumstance requiring special attention occurs, the TLS Phone Tree and email alert system will be activated.

Supervisors of Open Torch sessions contribute \$10 per day towards the cost of oxygen and gas.
