#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Speaking of summer... the new roster for the summer class session is now available! Keep your eyes peeled for the email containing the list of available courses and links to our online registration system. Classes tend to fill up quickly, so don't delay – sign up today!

I have some exciting news to report regarding upgrades to the Ed Center and several of our programs. At the May Board meeting, the Board approved 2 proposals for purchases of new tools and equipment for the faceting and jewelry/metalsmithing programs. For the faceting program, we will be phasing out the old Graves faceting machines and adding 6 new Ultratec VL machines. For the jewelry/metalsmithing program, we will be acquiring additional flex shafts, a 35-pound anvil and stump, a 20-ton electric hydraulic press and several other crucial items. We are thrilled to update our facility with these wonderful new tools! They will go a long way to enhancing our class offerings, attracting new students and bringing even greater enjoyment to our current members and students.

We had a great turnout for the May general meeting. Frank Warner presented an excellent program on Making Freeform Gemstone Bowls. The level of detail he went into to describe his methods for selecting gemstone material for the bowls, the process of making his own machine to carve the bowls, as well as the entire carving process from start to finish was absolutely fascinating. He brought several examples of his gorgeous work that had the audience Oooh-ing and Aaaah-ing all throughout the presentation. Thank you, Frank, for a terrific program!

Before the start of Frank's presentation, everyone was pleasantly surprised when I presented Jim Johnston with the Frank W. Warner, III Lifetime Achievement Award! Jim is a longtime TLS member, and has been a great leader, mentor and teacher spanning the length of his membership. Jim's dedication, kindness and generosity over the years has been quite prolific, and his many selfless actions have helped shape TLS into the successful organization it is today. ## BOARD AND GENERAL MEETING MINUTES/HIGHLIGHTS

The May 3 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:33 p.m. by President Stacey Segal. The minutes of the April Board and General Meetings were approved as distributed. Announcements: Stacey Segal announced that Paul Stieff had surgery yesterday. Linda Green shared that Paul is well and is home resting. Stacey wished Paul a speedy recovery. Stacey then announced that Kathy Lopez's mother-in-law passed away. Heartfelt condolences to the Lopez family. Get well and sympathy cards will be sent.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Ken Dahl reported cash inflow and outflow for the month of April showed a positive net inflow.

#### **Committee Reports:**

<u>Membership</u>: Gary Cummings reported that new membership applications from Donald Logeman and John Ehlen met all requirements. The reinstatement application of a previous member, Kathy Polansky, was also submitted. All were approved.

Community Programs/DCAC: On behalf of Linda Green, Stacey Segal reported that there is a grant available through the PA Council of the Arts called the Creative Sector Flex Fund: a \$5000 grant for Arts organizations. Stacey stated she will do some research to be sure this is something which qualifies TLS to apply. Stacey also mentioned that Kathy Lopez is working on sending out an email to interested parties for the scouts program.

<u>Programs</u>: Tina Brunner reported on the upcoming programs for the fall General Meetings. September will be a presentation by Chris Hafner. October will be the silent auction. Tina shared that she is working on planning the November program. Stacey Segal shared that Kathy Lopez gave her an update on the RSVP for the June Dinner at Charlotte's, which is a total of 17 so far. Tina offered to create a writeup for a reminder to submit reservations for the Bulletin.

Ed Center Director: Vincent DiAngelus stated there are no new updates. Upcoming work will include the repair to the caulking on the exterior glass block windows, and the protection of the gas meter.

<u>Class Manager</u>: Steve Hansen reported that Virtual Evercrafting workshops this past weekend went well. Steve expressed thanks to Lisa Laffend for all her help. Main Line School Night session is this weekend. Steve encouraged tidying up at

Gemarama: Barry Messino and Anthony Lombardo reported that the next Gemarama meeting is May 17. Barry also shared that the committee will begin going through the bins for the grab bags in June. A box will be available in the Ed Center for grab bag donations. Barry stated that she placed some of the Gemarama bookmarks in some libraries. Frank Warner stated that the new discount coupon bookmarks will be ready for use in June along with the online ticketing.

<u>Webmaster</u>: Frank Warner reported that Zasha Morales-José will be taking care of the summer class page. Frank also shared that the class page will be organized and rearranged so that the classes will be near the top of the webpage.

#### **New Business**

- •Ken Dahl announced that the estate of the late Barbara Jacobson, a dedicated member of TLS along with her late husband Bob, has bequeathed \$20,000 to TLS. Frank Warner added that there will also be items for the memorial case.
- After some review and discussion, Stacey Segal made a motion to approve Steve Hansen's proposal for the purchase of six new UltraTec faceting machines to enhance the growth of the TLS Faceting Program. The proposal was unanimously approved.
- •Stacey Segal reviewed the details of a jewelry program proposal and made a motion to approve the purchase of new equipment including flex shafts, a 35lb anvil and stump, a 20 ton hydraulic press, plus a workbench and cabinets, to support the TLS jewelry program. It was unanimously approved.
- Stacey Segal made a motion for the purchase of a new refrigerator for the Ed Center to replace the old, inefficient one. Following approval, there was discussion about the best plan to have the old refrigerator removed.
- •Stacey Segal announced that Doug Klieger will be stepping down from his role as Webmaster and that he has submitted his official resignation. Stacey then made a motion to appoint Zasha Morales-José as our Webmaster for TLS, as she has been well prepared in the duties for this role. It was approved. Frank Warner added that he has changed ownership of both the Bluehost and Network Solutions accounts to Ken Dahl as it is best to have the Treasurer be the owner of these accounts.
- Gary Cummings gave an update on the Coren and Colio awards. Gary encouraged anyone who hasn't voted to email their nominations by May15th.

### SUMMER CLASSES BEGIN JULY 6, 2023 TLS Education Center,

#### 24 UPLAND ROAD, BROOKHAVEN, PA 19015

TLS offers classes to adults interested in pursuing lapidary and jewelry arts. No previous experience is needed unless a prerequisite is noted. In some courses and workshops there is an additional charge for supplies and equipment. Pricing for classes is listed for members (M) and non-members (NM). Membership requires completion of Beginning Cabochon or Faceting class, participation in two TLS monthly meetings and willingness to participate as a volunteer in TLS activities. Course details, including the required supply and tool lists for many classes, and our online registration system, may be found at <a href="https://www.lapidary.org/classes-summer-2023">https://www.lapidary.org/classes-summer-2023</a>. Fees for supplies are payable to the instructors and may depend on the choice of materials.

REFUND POLICY: If you wish to withdraw from a class, workshop, or open shop session, you must notify the Registrar by phone or email. Payment will be refunded 100% if you withdraw before the course, workshop, or open shop sessions begins. For multiday courses (not workshops or open shop sessions), payment will be refunded 80% if you withdraw before the second class. No refunds are given after the second meeting of a multi-day course. No refunds are given after the first day of a multi-day workshop. No refunds are given for missed open shop sessions (Exception: Members may receive a 50% refund, if requested, after missing an open slab-saw session).

Students are enrolled in the order that online payments or checks and registration forms are received. Please note: Checks for full tuition must accompany the registration form in order to reserve a spot in the class. ### \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* INSTRUCTOR BENEFIT

It is TLS policy that TLS members who teach a regular course (fall, winter, spring, or summer) or a substantial workshop may, within the following twelve months, take a regular class or workshop without paying the normal member tuition. Any special course fees or materials fees in excess of tuition must be paid by the member making use of this benefit.

Instructors who wish to take advantage of this policy must advise the Registrar of the specific course or workshop for which they would like to use the benefit.

A TLS member who supervises an Open Shop session, other than Open Slab Saw, may, at no cost, be a participant in that Open session. Supervisors of Open Torch sessions contribute \$10 per day towards the cost of oxygen and gas. A TLS member who supervises five hours of Open Slab Saw may use the slab saws for one hour free as long as at least one other TLS member certified in slab saw use is present, as required by the TLS Safety Rules.

### TLS History Series #25 TLS Meetings and Programs

The TLS Bylaws state that regular meetings of the Society "shall be held preferably on the second (2nd) Wednesday of each month, except that no stated meetings shall be held in the months of July and August."

The initial meeting was held March 13, 1957, in the home of Roger Kettiman. Subsequent meetings that initial year were held in members' homes. Membership grew to a point that taxed the capacity of members' homes for meetings, making it necessary in May 1958 to set a limit of twenty members. The membership limit was increased to forty at the November 1958 Board meeting after it was announced that TLS could use a meeting room in the Broomall Library as of December that year.

In April 1963, when the membership count was 31, space was offered for meetings in the Delaware County Institute of Science in Media. Meetings were held there from April 1963 through May 1985. In September 1985, meetings were moved to the Princeton Presbyterian Church on Baltimore Pike in Springfield. In January 1989, meetings were moved to the current location in the Springfield Township Building at 50 Powell Road, Springfield, PA.

With the incorporation of TLS in 1967, and with the decision in 1960 that the Board of Directors would meet separately on 1st Wednesdays, the 'regular' meetings of the membership effectively became what are known as 'general' meetings of a corporation.

The Bylaws specify that, "an annual meeting of the members of the Society shall be held for the election of Officers and Directors. This meeting shall take place in December, the last stated meeting of the calendar year." In addition to the election of Officers and Directors, the December meeting has become an annual holiday party. The June 1962 meeting began the tradition of an annual dinner meeting.

The remaining eight meetings per year are planned by the Program Chair. A complete list of all of the programs from the initial 1957 meeting through 2022 is far too long to publish in the Bulletin. The list of dedicated and hard working members who have planned all of these programs follows. Program Chairs are appointed by the President with the consent of the Board of Directors and serve an indeterminate term.

Here are descriptions of competitions, judging, and awards. AFMS Uniform Rules will not be used in the evaluation of cases and the selection of awards. Material selection, craftsmanship, presentation, and showmanship are the key factors.

#### \*\*GROUND RULES FOR EXHIBITORS & AWARD SELECTION\*\*

**JUDGING:** Judging will take place prior to the opening of the show on Saturday; identifying labels will be added to the cases when judging is complete.

**AWARD SELECTION:** A committee of judges will evaluate all cases and select winners of the four category awards:

Most Educational (All educational exhibits are eligible.)

Best Theme Display - "WORLD OF QUARTZ" (All exhibits of theme material are eligible.)

Best Non-Member Display (Cases by non-members only are eligible.)

Best Small Case – 18" x 12" (Cases by TLS members only are eligible.).

Judging committee will select cases for Best in Show and Director's Award.

ELIGIBILITY FOR AWARDS: An exhibitor may win only one of the four category awards; all cases, including winners of category awards, are eligible for Best in Show or Director's Award. An exhibitor cannot receive an identical award two years in a row. For example, the winner in 2022 of the Educational Award is not eligible for the Educational Award in 2023. Certain TLS exhibits are not eligible for awards (Single Stone exhibition, Education Center display, Memorial cases, Intarsias, etc.).
