# BOARD MEETING MINUTES/HIGHLIGHTS

The September 6 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:33 p.m. by President Stacey Segal. The minutes of the August Board meeting were approved as distributed. <u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Ken Dahl reported cash inflow and outflow for the months of July and August. August numbers are delayed due to manual class registrations.

#### **Committee Reports:**

<u>Membership</u>: Gary Cummings reported that two individuals have met requirements for membership; Mauricio Riaño and Kira Hecht (junior membership). Both were approved. <u>Community Programs/DCAC</u>: Linda Green reported that today's DCAC meeting included discussion for Delco Arts Week,

Linda shared that TLS will have tables at two upcoming community programs, which include Philadelphia Mineralogical Society's Mineral Treasures in Mont Clare, PA on September 9, and Brookhaven Family Day on September 30.

Programs: Tina Brunner reported on the upcoming programs for the Fall General Meetings. September will be an in-person presentation by Chris Haefner. October will be the silent auction. November will be a Zoom presentation given by Bob Rush from Rock and Gem magazine, and December will be the holiday party and election of officers. Tina then reported on additional information for a TLS field trip to the National Gem Collection at the Smithsonian. Quotes for bus tours have been around the \$2000 mark, with a minimum of 30 passengers. Tina stated that with travel time there would be about 5 hours of tour time in the museum. Discussion on this topic resulted in moving forward with a survey to gauge interest. Stacey Segal reported that Kathy Lopez has scheduled a meeting for the 11 members interested in outreach for education, which includes starting the Scouts program. Ed Center Director: Vincent DiAngelus reported that a good

<u>Class Manager</u>: Stacey Segal reported, on behalf of Steve Hansen, that fall classes start this week. Another faceting workshop and several open cabbing sessions were added for December. The October 14 - 15 MLSN session sold out quickly. Another MLSN session was added for October 28 -29. Steve wanted to express thanks for the flexibility of our glass program and beginner cabbing instruction staff for making that happen. Development of the winter 2024 schedule is under way, to be ready for publication at Gemarama. Any classes you would like to take or teach, please reach out to Steve.

Registrar: Bill Frampton gave thanks to Barbara Bates, Sheryl Dahl, and Frank Warner for their efforts during the alternate registration process period. Registrations have been successful via email communication while waiting for the online system to be repaired. Additional thanks were expressed to Bill Frampton, Ken Dahl and Zasha Morales-José. Library and eBay: Stacey Segal reported that she has a number of wheels to list on eBay as well as faceting machines that do not sell to members at the next silent auction. Gemarama: Barry Messino reported that she has put up Gemarama flyers, along with discount tickets, and encouraged others to do so as well. Lisa Laffend shared that Gemarama volunteer sign up sheets and a poster with a QR code for online sign up are available at the Ed Center. Barry encouraged students to sign up. Lola Fields will also be sending out emails. Anthony Lombardo added that there will be an article with changes to the Gemarama floor plan in the next Bulletin.

<u>SKIP</u>: Dennis Coren reported that five SKIP awards will be presented at the next General Meeting.

<u>Webmaster</u>: Zasha Morales-José reported on the website launch with the fall class schedule and has been keeping the Gemarama vendors listings up to date.

- •Stacey Segal reported that the rolling mill was purchased and delivered and will soon be installed on the workbench. Thanks to Dennis Coren for securing the discount price.

•Teachers, please encourage your students to share their enthusiasm in the Demo Area and/or share their time in the volunteer areas! Remember that a two hour commitment at Gemarama can replace one meeting requirement for prospective members.

#### **Volunteer Opportunities**

#### Pre-show activities:

On Thursday afternoon, we start loading the truck at the Ed Center with everything we'll need at the show. Then, starting at 8:00 Friday morning at the Expo Center, we'll unload the truck, set up tables, cover them, put up signs, and get everything ready for opening Saturday morning. We provide lunch for volunteers on Friday and dinner for the volunteers and our vendors.

#### During the show:

Demos: Bring your enthusiastic, talented self and show off your skills and talents! We'll have cabbing and faceting machines available, and space for you to demo or discuss any jewelry related process you'd like: wire wrapping, wax carving, beading, chain maille, metalsmithing, PMC, channel, intarsia, and lampworking, or any other jewelry craft. We won't have torches, but you can still bring your work to show off.

Admissions: We now have an online ticketing system. We need people to collect tickets and money at the door and to keep track of and direct people coming in.

TLS Booth: This is our operations center for the show, and you'll help with the Treasure Wheel, Grab Bags for the kids, and other activities.

Silent Auction: The silent auction volunteers help visitors sign up to bid and help organize and distribute the winnings at the end. This is a very popular event at the show and raises a lot of money for TLS!

Kid's Table: The Kid's Table is fun for the whole family, with crafts and a scavenger hunt. Volunteers will help make sure they have the supplies they need, but adults are required to stay with their children.

Education Center Table: Located by the Demo area, this is an opportunity to talk to our visitors about TLS. We'll have printed information about TLS, a draft of the upcoming winter class schedule, and more.

Post-show activities:

What goes up must come down! These last items are VERY IMPORTANT parts of our effort to put on a great show and cannot be left to just a few members. These tasks do require lifting of some heavy objects. Please volunteer to help.

From 5pm to about 7pm on Sunday, we will pack up TLS equipment, including the exhibit cases, and load the truck with everything that came from the Ed Center. We will start to fold and stack the tables and chairs as the TLS booths are packed up.

Once the truck is loaded, it will return to the Ed Center. Some volunteers will go to the Ed Center to unpack the truck and put everything away in the storage room. This is a great opportunity for people who live near the Ed Center to help! If you want to help, but were not at the show, we can contact you to let you know when the truck will arrive. Generally, this activity will take place from 7pm to 9pm.

In the meantime, volunteers are needed at the Expo Center, too, to continue to collapse and stack the tables and chairs as the vendors are packing up their booths. The last vendor is usually out by 9pm.

# 2023 GEMARAMA THEME World of Quartz

Quartz is the second most common mineral on Earth. It is composed of silicon and oxygen. It is a component of most of the rocks on Earth, and makes up most of the sand on Earth. Pure quartz is colorless, but can become colored from impurities. Quartz comes in every color of the rainbow. It is a fairly hard gem, ranking at 7 on the Mohs hardness scale.

The quartz family of gemstones is enormous. Amethyst, citrine, rose quartz, smoky quartz, agate, jasper, chalcedony, carnelian, aventurine, tiger's eye, onyx, prasiolite, rock crystal, Herkimer diamonds, gem silica, and chrysoprase are all members of the quartz family.

Quartz can be macrocrystalline, meaning that the crystals are visible to the eye, or cryptocrystalline, meaning that you need a microscope to see the crystals. Amethyst and smoky quartz are macrocrystalline, while agate and jasper are cryptocrystalline.

Quartz gemstones can have some interesting optical effects. Tiger's eye is chatoyant, or displays a cat's eye when light is moved across the stone. Rose quartz and yellow quartz can display asterism, which means a star is visible on the surface of the stone because of the way other mineral crystals are aligned inside the stone. Aventurescence is a phenomenon named after aventurine quartz, and means that the gemstone has small particles of a metallic substance embedded that look like glitter. In the case of aventurine, this is usually mica flakes or hematite particles that give the appearance of gold or silver glitter.

Besides being an outstanding gemstone, quartz is also used in industry. Quartz has been used since ancient times to make glass, and synthetic quartz crystals are used to make many things from watch crystals to cell phones to computers because of their electrical properties. Because quartz is so hard, it is used as an abrasive in sandpaper, soap, and toothpaste.

You will be able to see many quartz gemstones on display in the Tuscarora Lapidary Society's exhibition showcases in Hall E, and you will be able to purchase quartz gemstones of every variety imaginable from our wonderful selection of gemstone and mineral dealers. We hope you enjoy the show!

A TLS member who supervises five hours of Open Slab Saw may use the slab saws for one hour free as long as at least one other TLS member certified in slab saw use is present, as required by the TLS Safety Rules.

### **\*\*GROUND RULES FOR EXHIBITORS & AWARD SELECTION\*\***

JUDGING: Judging will take place prior to the opening of the show on Saturday; identifying labels will be added to the cases when judging is complete.

AWARD SELECTION: A committee of judges will evaluate all cases and select winners of the four category awards:

*Most Educational* (All educational exhibits are eligible.)

Best Theme Display - "WORLD OF QUARTZ" (All exhibits of theme material are eligible.)

Best Non-Member Display (Cases by non-members only are eligible.)

Best Small Case - 18" x 12" (Cases by TLS members only are eligible.).

Judging committee will select cases for Best in Show and Director's Award.

ELIGIBILITY FOR AWARDS: An exhibitor may win only one of the four category awards; all cases, including winners of category awards, are eligible for Best in Show or Director's Award. An exhibitor cannot receive an identical award two years in a row. For example, the winner in 2022 of the Educational Award is not eligible for the Educational Award in 2023. Certain TLS exhibits are not eligible for awards (Single Stone exhibition, Education Center display, Memorial cases, Intarsias, etc.).
