BOARD MEETING MINUTES/HIGHLIGHTS

The August 2 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by President Stacey Segal. The minutes of the June Board and General Meetings were approved as distributed. Treasurer's Report: Ken Dahl reported cash inflow and outflow for the month of May. Outflow included payments for the banquet, the accountant, and new purchases for the jewelry and lapidary programs.

Committee Reports:

Community Programs/DCAC: Linda Green reported that today's DCAC meeting included reports on the organizations' summer programs and the planning of activities for Delco Arts Week, September 30-October 8. The TLS Open House for Delco Arts Week will be October 6, from 5-8pm. Linda shared that TLS will have tables at two upcoming community programs which include Philadelphia Mineralogical Society Mineral Treasures in Mont Clare, PA, September 9, and Brookhaven Family Day, September 30.

Programs: Tina Brunner reported on the upcoming programs for the Fall General Meetings. September will be an in-person presentation by Chris Haefner. October will be the silent auction. November will be a Zoom presentation given by Bob Rush from Rock and Gem Magazine. Tina reported on her research for a TLS field trip to the National Gem Collection at the Smithsonian. Stacey Segal reported that Kathy Lopez obtained some information for starting the Scouts program. Ed Center Director: Vincent DiAngelus reported that the new refrigerator is in place at the Ed Center. The caulking at the top of the exterior glass block windows was replaced. PECO completed the replacement of the power pole and transformer at the intersection of the TLS property. PECO still needs to work on the meter and downspout relocation. Vincent also reported that the recent ant infestation in the walls of the Ed Center has been resolved. Vincent then reported on issue of an abundance of fallen berries on the Ed Center property from a neighbor's tree that when tracked into the Ed Center, the carpets are being stained. Vincent offered to inquire with the neighbor regarding the possibility of trimming back the tree to the property line. Class Manager: Steve Hansen reported that the fall schedule is complete, proofread, and to be issued this Friday, after discussion regarding including an additional open cab session. Frank Warner shared that Mimi Favre reported that all dealer slots are filled and we are just waiting on one last contract. For any donations for the auction, please include with your items an estimate of their value. Send items to Ellen Schwarzkopf by the end of August. Barry also reported that she will be gathering items for the kids table, which include geodes and shark's teeth. Barry shared appreciation in advance to those who can put up flyers and signs in their local areas.

<u>Webmaster</u>: Zasha Morales-José reported on the launch for next week of the Fall Class schedule and ensures that the Gemarama dealers' contracts will match with what is on the website.

Old Business

- •Steve Hansen reported on the shipment and set up of the Ultratec faceting machines at the Ed Center, as well as packing up the present units for sale at the silent auction. How to present the units at the silent auction will be discussed at the next Board meeting. Stacey Segal reported that the new items for the jewelry program are all on order with the exception of the rolling tool cabinet. Stacey shared that she is confirming that the tool cabinet choice will work with the set up. Vincent DiAngelus offered to assist with the pick up of the cabinet.
- •Stacey Segal reported that she is preparing to set up a nomination committee to discuss nominations for officers to be voted on during the December meeting.

•New Business

- •Frank Warner reported that PayPal retired some of their software in June and this has affected the functionality of the Paypal payment button on the TLS website. Hoff Communications hopes to resolve this issue by August 10, but if not resolved by August 14, there is a plan in place to handle the fall class registrations.
- •Ken Dahl reported that he received a letter from Jim Johnston stating that the July payment for the loan he had provided for the purchase of the TLS Ed Center back in 2010 would be the last payment needed. Jim has very generously donated the balance of the loan to TLS. The board expressed it's gratitude for Jim's donation.
- •Ken Dahl reported that Frank Warner has been compiling a record of volunteer hours in 2022, as needed for application for renewal of our status as a PA Purely Public Charity. He will be meeting with Frank to complete the process. This reapplication occurs every five years.
- •Stacey Segal made a motion to purchase a new rolling mill for the Ed Center. It was approved by the Board.
- •Stacey Segal led a discussion regarding class no shows and last-minute cancelations. Stacey proposed extra verbiage in the cancelation policy, with reminders to avoid canceling close to the day of class. Waitlisted people need enough no-

tice to have a chance to attend. It was also stated that instructors should be consistent in sending out reminder emails to students prior to class. For tracking trends, instructors are also asked to submit names of those no shows or last-minute cancelations to the Registrar.

•Stacey Segal announced that Jay Rosa has resigned from his position as Single Stone Chair. Stacey stated that she will write something up for the Bulletin.

SEPTEMBER PROGRAM

September's program will be a presentation by amateur paleontologist Chris Haefner on his discovery of the *Yorkicystis haefneri* fossil.

Chris Haefner has been a fossil hunter for forty years, beginning in his childhood. He worked with a family member to hunt fossils and helped to assemble fossil boxes, 50,000 of which were donated to the Smithsonian Museum.

Chris and his wife founded the Lancaster County Fossil & Mineral Club in 2014. The LCFMC teaches its members to rockhound for fossils, rocks, and gemstones and conducts exploration through Pennsylvania and Maryland.

It was shortly after the founding of the LCFMC that at a monthly club meeting, a guest from York alerted the club to a hill being excavated in York that had some interesting rocks. The club members cracked rocks for a year, and Chris found a fossil that he had never seen before. In fact, no one had ever seen this fossil before. Chris had found the Holy Grail of fossil hunters...a brand-new species.

Eventually, Chris unearthed a second sample of the same species, which was named for him. Both specimens of *Yorkicystis haefneri* are currently housed in London's Natural History Museum. Chris' two specimens of Yorkicystic haefneri are the only specimens that have been found to date.

Chris will be giving his presentation in person, so physical attendance at the meeting is VERY strongly recommended. A Zoom link will be provided for those who cannot attend in person.

TLS offers classes to adults interested in pursuing lapidary and jewelry arts. No previous experience is needed unless a prerequisite is noted. In some courses and workshops there is an additional charge for supplies and equipment. Pricing for classes is listed for members (M) and non-members (NM). Membership requires completion of Beginning Cabochon or Faceting class, participation in two TLS monthly meetings and willingness to participate as a volunteer in TLS activities. Fees for supplies are payable to the instructors and may depend on the choice of materials.

INSTRUCTOR BENEFIT

It is TLS policy that TLS members who teach a regular course (fall, winter, spring, or summer) or a substantial workshop may, within the following twelve months, take a regular class or workshop without paying the normal member tuition. Any special course fees or materials fees in excess of tuition must be paid by the member making use of this benefit.

Instructors who wish to take advantage of this policy must advise the Registrar of the specific course or workshop for which they would like to use the benefit.

A TLS member who supervises an Open Shop session, other than Open Slab Saw, may, at no cost, be a participant in that Open session. Supervisors of Open Torch sessions contribute \$10 per day towards the cost of oxygen and gas. A TLS member who supervises five hours of Open Slab Saw may use the slab saws for one hour free as long as at least one other TLS member certified in slab saw use is present, as required by the TLS Safety Rules.

TLS History Series #27 TLS Library

It was recognized early in the life of the Society that books and other printed materials on lapidary and related subjects are important resources for the membership. In the second year, 1958, a list of member owned books that could be borrowed was circulated. In the third year, President Bankes was asked to appoint a Library Committee. He appointed the Kettimons, and the book Gemcraft was purchased for the Society. Beginning in the fourth year, Librarian Jack Taylor carried books to meetings for members to borrow. That practice continued until 1964 when the first TLS Library was established in some special bookcases at the Delaware County Institute of Science where the General Meetings were being held at the time.

The Library moved to the TLS Skill Center in 1979, and moved again in 2011 to our current much larger TLS Education Center.

The Library grew substantially under the direction of Gerry Privoznik, who supervised the collection for 17 years from 1968 through 1984, and has grown much more under the careful guidance of Stacey Segal, now in her 20th year of supervising the collection. A major contribution by Stacey has been the creation of the following online catalog for the TLS Library:

This is a wonderful online resource, listing all of the books in the TLS Education Center Library. One can easily sort the list by author, title, or publisher.

Anyone visiting the TLS Education Center can browse through the collection of books, magazines and periodicals available for viewing. TLS Members have the additional benefit of being able to sign out books except for "reference" books which must remain in the Library.

We are fortunate to have a truly outstanding collection of over 720 books on lapidary, rock hounding, geology, mineralogy, metalsmithing, jewelry making, glass, wire wrapping, casting, beading, carving and much more.

ELIGIBILITY FOR AWARDS: An exhibitor may win only one of the four category awards; all cases, including winners of category awards, are eligible for Best in Show or Director's Award. An exhibitor cannot receive an identical award two years in a row. For example, the winner in 2022 of the Educational Award is not eligible for the Educational Award in 2023. Certain TLS exhibits are not eligible for awards (Single Stone exhibition, Education Center display, Memorial cases, Intarsias, etc.).
