Let's SKIP into March

I am referring to embracing TLS's Skill Improvement Program (SKIP)! SKIP encourages us to refine our skills to progressively higher levels of craftsmanship in a given area of the lapidary arts. Currently, TLS judges the following SKIP Divisions of expertise: Cabochon, Faceted Stone, Channel Jewelry, Intarsia, Intarsia Jewelry, Sphere, Constructed Jewelry, Jewelry Casting, and Carving. Each Division is further divided into three levels of achievement: Apprentice, Journeyman, and Master.

To enroll in the SKIP Division of your interest, you can anonymously submit your work to Dennis Coren, the TLS SKIP chairman, or any other Board member, using your membership number to evaluate your work for a given level of achievement. All submissions must be submitted according to the rules prescribed in the SKIP Handout, which was given to all new members as part of their acceptance to TLS.

I am sure many of you have already finished items worthy of a SKIP submission. By submitting your work, you will get objective commentary from a TLS expert regarding your workmanship, which is graded according to a rigorous set of criteria for a given level of achievement described in the SKIP Handout. Your point score and the comments and suggestions provided by the TLS judge are helpful for continued improvement. Upon completing a given level of achievement within a Division, a certificate and a metal feather will be awarded as a token of achievement. All entries will be returned to you at the subsequent General Meeting.

For the February Program, Kathy Lopez provided an in-depth introduction to our guest speaker, Justin Prim. Justin's presentation centered around how faceted stones are cut in various parts of the world by comparing handpiece machinery with our mast machines, common in the United States. In his presentation, he leaned towards cutting mined rough using traditional cuts emphasizing color and carat weight. Lastly, he noted that the fantasy cuts in facet rough popular here were, as of yet, not widespread in other parts of the world.

The March 13th General Meeting will feature the Silent Auction, held in person at the Springfield Township Building. We encourage all members to consider donating their extra rough or other lapidary supplies for the auction. In addition, TLS will have additional rough for the Silent Auction acquired from previous donations/acquisitions. The Silent Auction is always well-attended, so do not miss out on all the great deals.

Also, consider it an opportunity to find a new piece of rough that needs value added as your submission to SKIP.

The Spring registration for classes and workshops opens on February 26th. Make sure to register early because many of the classes and workshops fill up quickly.

In conclusion, be inspired to enroll in SKIP and climb the ladder of lapidary achievement.

He was my Beginner Cabochons teacher and I learned so much from him. He also taught me how to clean all the saws on clean-up days, oversaw many of my Open Cabbing sessions, and was one of my instructors for Advanced Cabochons. Board Meeting Minutes/Highlights

The February 7 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:31 p.m. by President Ingrid Ratsep. The minutes of the January Board meeting were approved as distributed.

Announcements: Ingrid Ratsep reflected on the contributions of Bill Frampton, who passed away on January 22. There was discussion on how to honor Bill. Frank Warner stated that he has been in contact with Bill's wife Joan, to collect photos and items for the TLS memorial case in the Ed Center. Tina Brunner will spearhead the development of a presentation highlighting Bill to be shared at a future General Meeting.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: Sheryl Dahl, on behalf of Ken Dahl, reported on cash outflow for the month of January. Instructor's fees, insurance, reimbursement for canceled classes, and payment for work on our website contributed to the outflow total. Materials for the TLS tax returns are being prepared.

Committee Reports:

Membership: Doug McNicol reported that four individuals have met the requirements for membership. A motion was made to approve Adina Cook, Cynthia Fink, David Fink and Jennifer Mermans for full membership. All were approved. Community Programs/DCAC: Linda Green, interim chair, announced that she attended today's DCAC meeting by ZOOM which was devoted to discussion on the Delco Gives program which will be May 8 & 9. Linda added that 2026 will be the 250th anniversary of the nation. Celebrations will take place across the country and Pennsylvania is looking for artists to decorate fiberglass Liberty Bells to be displayed in all the counties. Ingrid Ratsep suggested using a photo of the TLS intarsia Liberty Bell and feature it somehow during the 2026 anniversary celebration. Any ideas should be emailed to Linda Green. Linda also confirmed that for the Delaware Mineralogic show, the first weekend in March, that John Chickadel, Don Schwarzkopf and Ellen Schwarzkopf will be doing demos at the show. At a meeting for the scouting outreach, a badge program was discussed.

<u>Programs</u>: Kathy Lopez reported that she is working on tech set-up with speaker Justin Prim for next week's General Meeting presentation. Linda Green suggested adding a folder to the Dropbox so that speakers could add their presentations. Lisa Laffend will work with Kathy to ensure things are in place Ed Center Director: Vincent DiAngelus reported that the noise issue with the gas booster in the jewelry room was solved. Vincent then thanked Barry Messino for bringing in supplies for the Ed Center. Vincent asked for a volunteer to obtain supplies as needed. Items include toilet paper, paper towels and hand soap. Tina Brunner and Doug Schwarzkopf both volunteered as they have memberships to warehouse clubs. Vincent then presented the quote to recoat the Ed Center roof. A motion was made to move forward with the roof repairs and it was approved. Class Manager: Steve Hansen reported that the spring schedule is circulating for instructor review. Steve then presented his proposal to sell the Facetron and Ultra Tec V2 faceting machines in order to purchase another Ultra Tec VL faceting machine along with some quality polishing laps and dops. Backup for the planning and manual steps in the registration process are needed. A motion was made and approved for an Assistant Registrar position. A kiln was donated by Sara Caldwell, and thanks go out to Christy Potter for picking it up and taking it to the Ed Center. The second is a nice jewelry set and miscellaneous books from Mary and Paul Overbeck. Equipment and Facilities: Don Schwarzkopf reported that the motion sensor issue is fixed. He also reported that the rekeying of the locks will take place when the weather is warmer. Library and eBay: Stacey Segal reported that she will put the faceting machines that are not purchased on eBay. Ingrid Ratsep offered to take photos and Steve Hansen offered to create a write-up of features and additional parts for the listing. Gemarama: Barry Messino announced that the next Gemarama meeting is on March 20. Mimi Favre led discussion on her concerns regarding last month's approval for the surcharge of \$50 to dealers to help with increased costs.

<u>SKIP</u>: Dennis Coren encouraged instructors to make their students aware of the SKIP program.

<u>Webmaster</u>: Zasha Morales-José said that that the website contact information was updated following the passing of Bill Frampton.

New Business

- Frank Warner presented the issues regarding the functionality of the TLS email address verification and authorization. Frank stated that he met with Stacey Segal and will also meet with Vincent DiAngelus to come up with a solution.
- Ingrid Ratsep proposed awarding the different accomplished categories in SKIP with casted feather charms. Discussion followed with recommendations to cast the feathers during casting classes at the Ed Center and use different metals for the different levels. Ingrid will meet with Dennis Coren to go over details as well as develop a write up for the Bulletin.
- Ingrid Ratsep led discussion on the recommendation to purchase a fire blanket for the silver room at the Ed Center. Don Schwarzkopf volunteered to look into this. Vincent DiAngelus also volunteered to contact the fire extinguisher company for offerings.

SILENT AUCTION

We will be holding one of our two annual Silent Auctions on March 13, 2024 at the Springfield Township Building immediately after the conclusion of our TLS Business Meeting. Always popular, make sure to show up early to check out all of the available items up for bid! There will be jasper slabs (some up to 6 inches), agate slabs, miscellaneous rough and slabs, small geodes and nodules, Indonesian opalized petrified wood and Saturn jasper. Books, magazines, beads, a kiln, and a 45 drawer storage cabinet are just some of the other items being prepared for the auction.

HOW DOES THE SILENT AUCTION WORK?

First, bring something you wish to donate to the Club: rough, slabs, cabs, cut stones, findings, finished jewelry, equipment, tools, supplies, books, or whatever (not junk). Fill out one of the auction forms on the last page of this Bulletin or go to https://www.lapidary.org/IMAGES/TLSSilentAuctionForms.pdf for each item. (If you don't know what to put down for the price, leave it blank; help will be available at the meeting.) If you have more than three items to donate, copy the auction forms; there also will be extra forms at the meeting. Please remember, while you can check things out ahead of time, the Silent Auction begins only after the General Meeting is adjourned.

How does it work? When you choose what you want, write your name and your bid on the item's slip. Your bid must be just one increment over the last bid. If someone 'ups' your bid, fill in your next offer. When the table is closed, the last name on the list (the highest bid) gets to purchase the item.

Check out our new workshop offerings for the Spring term. Learn Chase and Repousse' from Ken Dahl or metalsmith techniques for the Hydraulic Press from Stacey Segal. In addition to our usual array of lapidary, glass, and metals classes, we will have sessions on jewelry photography and gemstone identification. If you've always wanted to start learning metalsmithing, check out our basic jewelry techniques workshop from our own renowned instructor, Helen Driggs. With this foundation, you'd be ready to move to Barry Messino's Beginning Silver class on either Wednesday afternoons or the one now offered on Thursday evenings.

It has been suggested that we schedule members who have experience with the Tucson Gem Show to give a presentation at a fall General Meeting in order to prepare members who will be attending next year and have no experience with the show, and to educate members about the show who cannot yet attend. Spring Classes Begin April 4, 2024

TLS offers classes to adults interested in pursuing lapidary and jewelry arts. No previous experience is needed unless a prerequisite is noted. In some courses and workshops there is an additional charge for supplies and equipment. Pricing for classes is listed for members (M) and non-members (NM). Membership requires completion of Beginning Cabochon or Faceting class, participation in two TLS monthly meetings and willingness to participate as a volunteer in TLS activities. Course details, including the required supply and tool lists for many classes, and our online registration system, may be found at https://www.lapidary.org/classes-spring-2024. Fees for supplies are payable to the instructors and may depend on the choice of materials.

NEW Class Refund Policy: Some classes and many open shop sessions fill up rapidly and have extensive wait lists. If you must drop out of a class or open shop session, please do so as early as possible so others may be given the opportunity to enroll. Your courtesy in doing so will be appreciated. Also, if you believe you are ill, or becoming ill, we respectfully ask that you decline to attend. If you wish to withdraw from a class, workshop, or open shop session, you must notify the Registrar and instructor by email. When refunds are requested, we retain 10% of tuition as a processing fee. Tuition will be refunded 100% (minus the processing fee) if you withdraw before 7 days prior to the start date of the course, workshop, or open shop session. If you withdraw 7 to 3 days prior to the start date, tuition will be refunded 80% (minus the processing fee). There will be no refunds for withdrawals within 2 days of the start of the class, workshop, or open shop session. In the event of emergencies or other extenuating circumstances, TLS will consider making exceptions to this policy on a case-by-case basis. If such an event or circumstance occurs, please email the registrar with your inquiry and it will be reviewed as soon as possible.

Students are enrolled in the order that online payments or checks and registration forms are received. Please note: Checks for full tuition must accompany the registration form in order to reserve a spot in the class. (S24BS4-5) **Metals Shop – Know Your Hand Tools**: (One-day workshop, Friday, April 5) 10am-5pm. Limit 8. New/Beginner. In this one-day workshop, you will learn the basic processes and tools used in metalsmithing. We will learn about and practice using the basic 12 jewelry-making hand-tools essential for most fabrication processes. Please do not bring any tools to class. The fee includes a rental toolbox and practice materials. We will also review the safe use of classroom tools like the disc cutter and other equipment. Instructor: Helen Driggs. Tuition: NM\$60/M\$35. Materials and supplies fee (payable to the instructor), \$45.

WEEKEND WORKSHOPS

(S24FT4-6) **Beginner Faceting Weekend Workshop**: (Two-day workshop, Saturday & Sunday, April 6 & 7) 9AM-5PM. Limit 6. For new students. Facet a transparent glass gemstone

in the TLS #1 pattern. Instructors: Steve Hansen and Ingrid Ratsep. Tuition: NM\$130/M\$70.

(S24MM4-13) **Marble Making**: (Two-day workshop, Saturday & Sunday, April 13 & 14) 9AM-5PM. Limit 6. For beginners and those with some marble-making experience. Learn to make perfect spheres at the torch out of clear and colored borosilicate glass. Instructors: Tami O'Connell and Lisa Laffend. Tuition: NM\$170/M\$110 (includes \$50 fee for supplies and materials). A leather apron is required.

(S24AS4-27) **Textured Pendant with Reverse-set Faceted Stone**: (Two-day workshop, Saturday & Sunday, April 27 & 28) 10AM-5PM. Minimum 7, Maximum 10. Competent knowledge of soldering required. Learn how to make a pendant with a "cleaner" look. Students will use rolled texture and gallery wire as design elements. We will create a reverse-setting for the gemstone that does not include visible prongs. The stone is set from behind, allowing more focus to be directed to the piece's surface detail. Guest Instructor: Marthe Roberts-Shea. Tuition: NM\$245/M\$185.

(S24VA4-28) **Intro to Gemstone Carving** – Zoom (In studio): (Three-hour workshop, Sunday, April 28) 6-9PM. Minimum 4, Maximum 10. In this class, you will learn how to pick a great stone, the tools and materials you will need, and how to maximize the beauty of the stone using simple tools available in most workshops right now. Come to the TLS Ed Center for a fun class of exploration, design, discovery, and a heaping of water-logged shenanigans, and go away with a stunning stone that is truly, perfectly yours! Guest Instructor: Storm Rise. Tuition: NM\$145/M\$125 (Note: Tuition includes carving materials and carving bits kit).

(S24VA4-28R) **Intro to Gemstone Carving** – Zoom (Remote): (Three-hour workshop, Sunday, April 28) 6-9PM. Maximum 12. In this class, you will learn how to pick a great stone, the tools and materials you will need, and how to maximize the beauty of the stone using simple tools available in most workshops right now. Join by Zoom from your own studio for a fun class. Guest Instructor: Storm Rise. Tuition: NM\$125/M\$115 (Note: Tuition includes carving materials and carving bits kit).

(S24EL5-4) Enamel Painting Workshop: (Two-day workshop, Saturday & Sunday, May 4 & 5) 10AM-5PM. Minimum 6, maximum 8. Interested in learning an enameling technique that dates all the way back to the 16th century? In this class, you will learn about the antiquated painting technique, sometimes referred to as Limoges or painting with oxides, which was first seen in France in the middle of the 16th century. Essentially, they all describe the method of using finely ground metal and ceramic oxide powders and mixing them with an oil based medium to create a paint that can be used on an enameled surface. You will be working with Thompson ceramic oxides and Sunshine painting oxides. You will learn how to prep your copper sheet with a hard-fired white or cream enamel base, so that you have a clean canvas to paint on. From there, we will go over painting and firing of your designs. Often, we will fire these multiple times to achieve a beautiful painted enamel piece. No previous experience is necessary. (S24OP4-21/S24OP6-2/S24OP6-30) **Sunday Opal Cutting Workshops**: (Three One-day workshops, Sunday, April 21, Sunday June 2, Sunday, June 30) 10AM-5PM. Limit 6. Prerequisite: One TLS Gateway (Beginning) Cabochon course. Opal cutting for current or prospective opal addicts. Facilitators: Steve Hansen and Anna Thompson. Tuition: NM\$60/M\$35 per day. Materials fee, payable to the instructor, tbd depending on materials used.

(S24JP5-19) **Jewelry Photography**: (Sunday, May 19) 1-5pm. Limit 10. Learn how to improve your jewelry photography and editing skills. This workshop will take a hands-on, common-sense approach to lighting and photographing jewelry in various settings, focusing on simplicity and problem solving. Various editing apps and editing options will be discussed. Bring your phone, point-and-shoot, or SLR along with your best jewelry for a fun afternoon of shooting. There is always a way to get a great photo of your jewelry and you do not have to be a professional to figure it out. Instructors: Mara Wolff and Vincent DiAngelus. Tuition: NM\$40/M\$20.

In this workshop, students will be given a brief introduction to geologic processes that form our favorite faceted gemstones, followed by a discussion of mineral physical and optical properties that help us identify gemstones, and finally we will have a hands-on session using the most common diagnostic instruments to try to solve the mystery of the unknown gem. Students are encouraged to bring a faceted stone of their choice to identify. Instructor: John Chickadel. Tuition: NM\$60/M\$35.

(S24AS6-8) Introduction to Chasing and Repousse Weekend Workshop: (Two-day workshop, Saturday & Sunday, June 8 & 9) 10AM-4PM. Limit 4. This workshop will introduce concepts, tools, and methods of chasing and repousse (C&R). Consider a flat piece of metal: chasing yields a design on its side to be viewed, while repousse pushes out the material from the back to create visual depth in the finished piece. All working of the piece is done using steel punches and a hammer to move the metal to create the finished piece. Students will complete two pieces in the class using 2"x2" metal pieces – one with copper and one with sterling silver. A pitch bowl and set of basic C&R tools will be provided. Instructor: Ken Dahl. Tuition: NM\$120/M\$60. Materials fee (payable to the instructor) approximately \$20.

(S24AS6-15) **Introduction to the Hydraulic Press**: (Saturday, June 15) 12-3pm. Limit 4. In this workshop, students will learn the basic operations of the electric hydraulic press. Techniques taught in this class will include how to use a pancake die, a silhouette die, and an impression die. Students who complete the class will end the day with components that can be used as elements in their jewelry designs. A materials kit will be provided. Instructor: Stacey Segal. 
