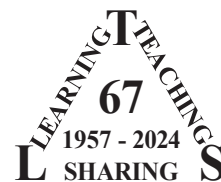

Board Meeting

Minutes/Highlights

The April 3 Board Meeting by Zoom was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by President Ingrid Ratsep. The minutes of the March Board meeting were approved as distributed.

Treasurer's Report: Ken Dahl reported cash on hand at the end of March. Transactions for the month of March were reviewed.

Committee Reports:

Membership: Doug McNicol reported that two individuals have met the requirements for membership. A motion was made to approve Meghan Schauer and Leah Joseph for full membership. Both were approved.

Community Programs/DCAC: Linda Green, interim chair, announced that she attended today's DCAC meeting by ZOOM which included discussion on the Delco Gives program which will be May 8 and 9. Over 200 nonprofit and art organizations are participating. Linda stated that everything is in place for the Open House at the Ed Center on May 3 from 5-8 PM. Linda also shared that Delco Arts has a website which will include a calendar of activities (see page 3). On May 9, from 4:30-7:00 pm, there will be a gathering of nonprofit organizations at Rose Tree Park in Media, PA. Any interested volunteers to man the TLS table can contact Linda. Linda also mentioned that the Delco Chamber of Commerce has roundtable meetings open to all and anyone interested in attending can contact her.

The Stripe account has been integrated into the website and will be used in the future. At present we continue to use PayPal.

Acquisitions: Doug McNicol reported on a donation from the estate of Mary Lynn Cosfol, which includes a kiln and various tools.

Equipment and Facilities: Don reported that he will contact the locksmith for the rekeying of locks at the Ed Center once the weather is warmer. Stacey Segal requested time to meet with Don to install the rolling mill at the Ed Center.

Library and eBay: Stacey Segal reported on two recent book donations, one by Joan Frampton from Bill Frampton's book collection and the other from Bill Mattis. Stacey then reported that any used wheels from clean-up day will go on eBay.

Gemarama: Anthony Lombardo reported on the first spring Gemarama meeting that was held March 20. Anthony announced the theme: Phenomenal Gems. Anthony stated the two general goals presented at the meeting: members of the committee were asked to find an associate member to help support key positions and the other is to develop ways to increase paid attendance at Gemarama by 20%. MAY'S PROGRAM

The speaker for May is no stranger to speaking to the public. Matt Moskal runs a very successful Youtube channel called Matt's Crazy Art (<https://www.youtube.com/@MattsCrazyArt/videos>). Matt runs the only channel on Youtube showing beginner wire wrappers some easy and quick techniques to make jewelry.

Matt has attempted to make a living from just about every form of art, but eventually turned to wire wrapped jewelry. He begged lessons from two experienced friends when he began wire wrapping, but soon started to experiment on his own. In time, most of Matt's best works were constructed from his own designs. Matt always searches for the quickest designs to execute.

Wire wrapping was extremely portable, Matt discovered, and could be sold at just about every venue one can imagine. Thus began Matt's foray into the world of jewelry shows. Matt spent ten years traveling around the country selling his wire wrapped jewelry.

Eventually, the desire grew to teach his methods to others, so in 2018, Matt started his Youtube channel and quickly grew his viewership to over 135,000 subscribers. Matt's channel demonstrates not only wire wrapping techniques, but also how to sell the resultant designs.

Matt will be giving his presentation in person, so it is very strongly recommended that members make every effort to attend in person. Many thanks to Vince DiAngelus for recommending this speaker.
